#### **Roualeyn George Gordon Cumming**

Of all the great Victorian eccentrics, perhaps the most bizarre in habits was the big game hunter, Roualeyn Gordon Cumming.

After years in South Africa as a lion hunter, during which he was suspected by the Boers of gun running to the natives, he returned to the UK to exhibit his trophies, first in London at the Crystal Palace Exhibition of 1851 then in Inverness.

In 1852, he bought the old Free High Church building in Bank Street to house his large collection of stuffed animals, skins and trophy heads.

He later moved to Fort Augustus in 1858 where he opened a museum on the canal bank beside the old Fort charging a shilling per person. This proved to be an entertainment diversion for the passengers on steamers with time on their hands when the steam boats went through the locks.

There can be few exhibits as exotic as Cumming himself, a power man of great physique, clad in extravagant Highland dress. He was usually accompanied by his faithful friend, Donald Cumming the local blacksmith and one of his tame goats. Roualeyn wore a kilt of Gordon tartan and a plaid of the same fastened by a large brooch, a frilled shirt, Highland bonnet or a brass helmet on his head, buckled shoes or boots and a great amount of jewellery including silver fishhooks in his ears and carried a high staff.

On warm days, he was known for wandering around clad only in his shirt and stockings carrying his kilt over his arm, his hair was dropped in long ringlets.

Cumming was known to wander in the woods in Glenmoriston from morning to night cutting down hazel which he would make into walking sticks for sale. He used to speak to everyone he met on the road in a very musical voice not what you would expect from such a large man. The young women in the area admired him greatly and used to

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present him with tartan plaids or silver jewellery.

He lived in a little thatched cottage in Fort Augustus but seemed to spend most of his time with his friend, Donald and his sister Peggy at the Smithy cottage in Invermoriston. Donald saw him as a hero and would do anything for him such as writing to Roualeyn's family and relatives requesting money for him. Many a supper Peggy prepared for him at all hours and it was no light snack as he thought nothing of finishing a whole leg of mutton and a dozen salt herring at one sitting and finishing off

with oatcakes and cheese.

Roualeyn Gordon Cumming came from Morayshire and after joining the Army, he visited Canada, India and South Africa with his regiment. His desire to explore the bush was so strong that he bought himself out of the army and spent five years as a big game hunter. He got together a collection of flora and fauna of Africa that proved to be one of the finest collections ever assembled by a single individual.

In his book, "Five Years Adventures In the Far Interior of South Africa" which ran to eight editions where he tells of meeting the Scottish missionary, David Livingstone in the wilds of Africa.

When Roualeyn first came home from foreign lands, he brought with him a little African servant but sadly the young African caught smallpox and died in the Inverness Infirmary much to his master's great grief.

When the exhibition closed, the timbers and the roof were used for the rebuilding of the Church of Scotland in the village.

Roualeyn died on 24th March 1866 in Fort Augustus.

It has been a quiet few months for the Shinty Club, we have all enjoyed a break away from shinty to a certain degree but are now gearing up for a busy Season 2023!

The Senior men's team have been training since early January, testament to their commitment by travelling up to Inverness to use all-weather facilities in town each Thursday evening and of course, 'enjoying' Vicky's class on a Tuesday night. The Men's team have a couple of pre-season friendly fixtures organised on Feb 18th against Lochcarron and Feb 25th against Oban Celtic, check the club's Facebook page for more information.

In addition to our Senior men's team, we are working to offer less competitive shinty to the males in our community, so if you haven't played shinty for a few years and are keen to give it another go, have just moved to the area and would like to give it a go or if you are 13+ and want to progress gently into senior shinty, then these sessions will benefit you greatly – please give Elaine a message on 07787 404472 if you are interested.

The Women's team have had a little more abrupt start to their season, when we hosted the Johnstone Trophy Indoor Tournament in the Nevis Centre, Fort William a few weeks ago – the Johnstone Trophy is the oldest competitive trophy in the Women's game and was donated to Glengarry Shinty Club by D.A. Johnstone Contractors of Invergarry in 1999. This was its return since Covid and the tournament was a great success, Skye Camanachd ran out winners after an exciting final against the holders, Badenoch. Our own team did well and were close to qualification to the semi's which is impressive given we had a lot of our younger girls playing for their first time ever indoors.

Our Juniors have, as always, been impressing and working hard – this winter, we have been fortunate enough to be allowed to use the Fort Augustus Village Hall for our junior sessions, with our rubber topped plastic sticks and soft ball, it is an ideal location for the kids to practice and blow off steam – sessions have been running over weekends, but demand and enthusiasm has been such from the kids that we have been running extra week night sessions when we can get access to the busy hall.



Our age group teams have been playing in some friendly indoor competitions in Fort William against other Lochaber area schools and our teams have done very well. This held them in good stead going in to the National Indoor First Shinty Primary School Lochaber Area Qualifiers, where our P5 (U10's) team did great and came through with 6 wins and 1 draw to seal their qualification to the National Finals – an amazing achievement for our small community. The National Finals take place in Fort William on Friday 24th February and I am sure the excitement going in to these will be unmanageable!

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The tenacity of our juniors never fails to impress our junior coaches, parents and club and we were blown away by the performances in the later part of the tournament, where they played some very impressive and skilful shinty, one game against Inverlochy, who were possibly the favourites to win the qualifiers. We found ourselves 2-0 down very quickly – in a 5 minute game, it didn't leave much time for a comeback, but comeback we did and were pretty quickly level at 2-2 and with the very last strike of the ball, Jack rocketed the ball in to the top of the net to give us a 2-3 win! A very impressive victory for the team and we won't mention the coaches' input at that particular moment (if you know, you know!!!!)

A change to the rules of eligibility for the qualifiers made it impossible for our P7 team to compete in their area qualifiers but we won't be the only team affected by this change and there will be plenty more games coming up for all the age group teams.

Our Junior Sessions are now on a Saturday morning and you can get the details on our club's Facebook page – it is always great to see new faces.

Elsie Marjory MacLean MacKenzie was born in Inverness on 11th January, 1938 to Duncan and Elsie MacKenzie, a baby sister for three year old Sheila. In 1940, the family moved to Newtonmore when Duncan was appointed Headmaster. The following year another daughter Kathleen was born. In 1948, the family moved to Edinburgh. Marjory (as she was always called) and her sisters loved life in Edinburgh. When Marjory left school, she went to work for the National Coal Board in Edinburgh. Later on, when the family moved to Inverness she worked for the Coal Board there. She then moved back to Edinburgh to be a receptionist at the Braid Hills Hotel. Some time later, she moved to Fort Augustus. She worked as a receptionist at the Lovat Arms Hotel. Marjory also worked for some time at the Glengarry Castle Hotel.

After leaving hotel work, she was employed in various places around the village; the Tourist Board, Coffee Shop, the Abbey, and as a relief Post Mistress. She also served for 10 years with the WRVS.

Marjory enjoyed travelling and holidaying abroad. She liked the outdoors and went for many walks with her beloved dogs, 'Lucy' and, later 'Max'. In Fort Augustus she bowled and, played tennis and golf. Her pride and joy was her garden and many a happy hour was spent adding plants and keeping it tidy.

Marjory was a trained soprano and sang with the Opera Companies both in Edinburgh and Inverness. Wherever she stayed, she would always attend church and, she became a choir member. She was an excellent artist and even painted the young Sean Connery when he was a model!

Marjory also liked meeting up with friends for coffee and attending any functions. She took great interest in the life of the Church and the village. She served on Fort Augustus Church Board and loved supporting events in the Hall and fundraising tea parties. Sadly, for the past four or five years she has had a lot of health problems. She spent quite a lot of time in and out of hospital. For the past vear, she was more or less housebound which she found very difficult. She went to hospital for the final time on her birthday

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in January when Marjory's health gradually deteriorated. Finally, she passed away peacefully in hospital on 10th February.

The family would like to thank Raigmore hospital for their tender care of her. The family would also like to thank the District Nurses and, those members of the Sunflower Home Care Group who called twice daily to give her any help they could. A special mention must be made of Mary Ann MacNally for exceptional loving care of Mariory, Nothing was too much trouble (even comina in the middle of the night if necessary).

Adam Philip's parents were married on 2nd January 1936 and on 13 April 1937, Adam was born on the family farm, "The Dale" at Clovenstone, Kintore in Aberdeenshire. Adam soon had a younger brother Gordon followed by a younger sister Molly. Adam also had a much older

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brother Johnny.

Adam's father was an engineer at the local papermills, while his mother tended the farm. When Adam was still a young loon, his mother began to suffer poor health, so from a tender age, Adam was tasked with many of the jobs around the farm. Before school each day, he'd milk the coos and wearing a shoulder yoke, deliver the milk to all his customers on his way to school. Coming home from school, he would collect all the empties. Adam soon became an expert at making cheese and butter and he kept his old butter pats as a fond reminder of his childhood.

His farm chores did not stop there. He broke in the Shelties (Shetland Ponies) for the Coal mines and became expert at dispatching and plucking the chickens, packing them, ready for their train journey to the London Hotels. Adam would often raise a jolly laugh by describing himself as the fastest puller and plucker in town.

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Adam had a lot of responsibility as a child. His schoolwork and learning needed his attention too. Encouraged by his father, Adam developed a love of the poetry of Robert Burns and was able to recite many of his poems by heart. This passion he shared with his father was life long and Adam found himself invited to the top table of many a Burns' Supper where he recited Burns with all the drama and expressiveness of a great story teller. He was even known to recite Burns in the Doric which was his speciality.

Adam knew from an early age he wanted to be an Engineer like his father. He had no illusions which job was the hardest and it was not engineering. He studied at Robert Gordon's college and attained his Highers and went on to study and gain his Higher National Diploma.

Adam served his apprenticeship at the Inverurie Locomotive works, working on all diesel engines. He was not a feertie of heights and was often called on to band industrial sized chimneys. He even worked on the original Forth Road Bridge, repairing girders by cold riveting. He was called up for National Service at age 21 and instead of joining the Royal Navy, he was able to join the Merchant Navy.

It was a very sad day for Adam when he sold the livestock from the farm before heading off to sea. Adam loved his time at sea and when his National Service ended, he promptly signed on again. Adam and his friend Arthur Crawford always enjoyed visiting new places when their ship was moored at some far-flung corner of the earth.

After the merchant navy, Adam met and married Betty. Together they had two daughters Karen and Sandra. Adam is also a grandfather and great grandfather.

Adam did various other jobs while bringing up his young family before starting a job with Gas and Equipment. Adam was based in the Aberdeen Branch but he worked all over the world. It was during his time with Gas and Equipment that Betty passed away. The company grew with the fast expanding Offshore Oil industry and Adam successfully oversaw the commissioning of production facilities in Stavanger Norway, Singapore and New Orleans.

In addition to the Offshore Oil Industry and helium based diving gases, Gas & Equipment developed industrial gas production and distribution facilities in the U.K., the main two being Irlam Manchester and Poplar/Stratford London.

It was 1986 at the new Cylinder Gases industrial facility, based in Blackwall, Poplar where Adam and Barbara first met and their romance soon developed (followed five years later by a very successful marriage). Six months after Adam had completed the production plant, the site was compulsory purchased by the Docklands **Development Corporation** for redevelopment. Adam immediately set about moving the gas production facility to a new site in Stratford London.

Adam then relocated to Stratford, London from Aberdeen and remained with Gas & Equipment in Stratford until retirement with Barbara to Scotland.

When Adam and Barbara retired to the Highlands in 2006, the aim was to live at a much slower pace away from the rat-race of London. Their retirement home "Deer Field" in Glenmoriston was where Adam was able to return to his farming roots. One of his first tasks was to clean the land as it had not been used for agriculture for over 30 years. He bought an old Massey Ferguson tractor to plough and plant the fields with hundreds of seed tatties. Along with the care of the animals, Adam loved cooking, making jams, his traditional Scottish soups and dishes, pates, meat pies and Anglo-Indian curries.

Wherever Adam went, he brought people and communities together through various hobbies and interests. The sharing of his homemade food and surplus produce from his small holding. Adam was a man who had a zest for life and a passion for Burns' Poetry and Song. So it was fitting that on the 25th of January, the anniversary of the birth of Robert Burns, folk celebrating Adam's life and wished him a fond fare weel.



Mhairi MacDonald was born on 20th December, 1943 in Larachbeg, Lochaline to Hugh and Mary Cameron. She was the youngest of seven children. Mhairi was christened Mary but, everyone called her 'Mhairi'.

Sadly, Mhairi lost her dad when she was 12 and her mum when she was 15. A decision was made for Mhairi to live with her uncle in Drimnin where she took on the role of caring for him and house keeping. A few years later, Mhairi started a house keeping job in the hotel in Onich.

Mhairi and Allan met at a dance in Lochaline and they married in 1965 at Fort William and lived in a caravan at Onich. Eventually, they settled in Fort Augustus where they had three children, Linda, Alexander and Gordon. Mhairi brought up the children while Allan went to work. Mhairi had a great love of badminton. She played in the Fort Augustus Badminton Club often travelling to play in tournaments.

As the children grew older, Mhairi worked at the Lovat Arms Hotel. She had various cleaning jobs in a few establishments in the village. She was often to be found caring for many an elderly lady or tending to a neighbour. She began working as a cleaner at Kilchuimen Academy in the early 1980's. She continued working at the Academy until her retirement in 2015 at the age of 72.

She loved spending time with her grandchildren, Fraser, Isla, Alanna, Laura, Alexander and Brooke whom she adored very much.

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## The Fort Augustus Men's Shed



#### SCOTTISH MEN'S SHEDS ASSOCIATION

#### What is The Men's Shed Association?

Men's sheds or community sheds are non-profit local organisations that provide a space for craftwork and social interaction. The movement originated in Australia around the 1980's to improve the health and wellbeing of men. There are now over 900 located across Australia, with thousands of active members. Men's sheds can now be found in the United Kingdom, the Republic of Ireland, United States, Canada, Finland, New Zealand and Greece. The slogan for men's sheds is "Shoulder to Shoulder", shortened from "Men don't tend to talk face to face, they tend to talk shoulder to shoulder".

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#### What is a Men's Shed

A shed is a place where men of any age can meet with one another and socialise and chew the fat over a cuppa or some other light refreshment. It can also be a place to pursue hobbies and pastimes or improve their craft skills and their use of tools or to make repairs or produce various items that may be of use to themselves and others or the community generally. It can also be a place to just come and make a cup of tea, sit down, relax, and read your preferred newspaper. Sheds are whatever the members want them to be.

Although labelled sheds, they often aren't sheds at all. They can be empty offices, portacabins, warehouses, garages, self-built sheds, etc. Some Sheds are purpose-built workshops, but they rarely start out that way. Many don't have premises at all in the beginning and instead form a group that meets regularly for the social connection, company and camaraderie, until they can find somewhere to kit out with tools... and a kettle.

This is the stage that the Fort Augustus Men's Shed is now at, i.e., NO SHED. At present, we meet once a week in The Caledonian Canal Café in Fort Augustus at 11 am. on a Wednesday morning – the number in attendance varies. The café makes excellent bacon, sausage and egg rolls but you will need to order by 11 am. at the latest.

As we can see the Men's Shed Association (national and worldwide) has been established for some time but the Fort Augustus branch is a new venture and we are eager to encourage all its members and any other interested parties, to contribute to its development. Currently, we have 10 signed up members and there are a further 12 people who have shown an interest but are awaiting future advancements.

#### Why are sheds needed?

Men typically find it more difficult to build social connections than women. Younger men have networks of friends and work colleagues and rarely share personal concerns about health or their personal worries. For some men, when retirement comes, it can feel like one's personal identity and purpose is lost. Men's Sheds can help to change that. Sheds are about meeting like-minded people and having someone to share your thoughts with. They are also about having fun and sharing skills and knowledge with like-minded people and by doing so gaining a renewed sense of purpose and belonging.

#### Our story so far

This venture grew out of the "men's coffee morning" that we have had once a week at a café in the village. The coffee morning has been ongoing for several years with a compulsory break for Covid. The venue has changed several times but is now as mentioned above.

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As stated previously, at present we have 10 members and 12 people who we have registered as interested. From the current members 4 people have formed a steering group to progress the way forward, i.e., the formulation of a development plan and a constitution and to seek out any possibilities of acquiring premises and to pursue any fund-raising opportunities. To this end we have had several meetings with local officials and future meetings are planned. Several possibilities of land or buildings have been mooted in the past but more recently a much more concrete proposal has been put forward for a piece of land to be purchased (in the very near future?) for the erection of a shed or sheds. This piece of land is situated close to the tennis court by Bunoich Brae. The Men's Shed is extremely hopeful that this proposal will come to fruition soon.

### **The Suicide Bereavement Support Service**

**The Suicide Bereavement Support service** is a Scottish Government funded pilot project. It's being delivered in Highland by Change Mental Health (previously Support in Mind Scotland) and the service has been set up to provide support to anyone who has been affected by suicide.

Once you've made contact, our specially trained staff will provide you with the space to talk through the many and complex emotions felt after a suicide, and offer ongoing, compassionate, and personalised support based on what you need at the time. Our team can also help with practical things, such as making funeral arrangements, or talking to hospitals, GPs or the police.

#### How can I access the service?

You can call us on **0800 471 4768** and leave a message or you can email us direct at: suicidebereavementsupport@nhs.scot

Our team can provide support to you over the phone, by secure video calling or if wanted, face to face. In most cases, ongoing support will be provided by the same person and is available for as long as you need it.

We can support you in the days and weeks following a suicide or if you've been bereaved in the past and still need support with your grief. All support is free and fully confidential.

As well as being available in Highland, the service is being trialled in Argyll and Bute and Ayrshire and Arran, and you can access the service if you live in any of the delivery areas, or the death of your loved one took place in one of the delivery areas but you may live elsewhere.

If you or someone you know would benefit from support, please don't hesitate to call us on 0800 471 4768 – leave a name and phone number and we will get back to you within 24 hours. And if you are currently being supported by another service and would prefer them to contact us, please ask them to refer you - your GP can also do this for you.

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# Nature Notes

#### **Opening April 2023 - Dundreggan Rewilding Centre**

Trees for Life has been rewilding the 10,000-acre estate at Dundreggan since 2008, which is home to more than 4,000 species of plants and animals, including many rare and protected species. In April, the new Dundreggan Rewilding Centre will open on the estate and become a gateway to this unique landscape that is rich in natural and cultural heritage.

Our rewilding work at Dundreggan is allowing the forest to recover through natural regeneration and important fragments of Scotland's Caledonian forest are expanding. Visitors can explore ancient pinewood, discover centuries of Gaelic history and connect with a landscape undergoing transformation through rewilding.

Lots of multi-sensory, hands-on activities will be available for the whole family, including pond dipping, scavenger hunts and shelter building, as well as specialist workshops to learn more about photography, bushcraft, foraging and much more.

Dundreggan is also the location of our tree nursery, where we grow around 90,000 trees every year, including Scots pine, aspen, birch, willow, rowan, juniper and oak, and visitors will be able to take guided tours of the nursery to learn more about the growing and planting process.

A network of footpaths, ranging from easy to strenuous, will meander through the Dundreggan landscape, offering visitors of all abilities an opportunity to spot wildlife, see rewilding in action and experience what makes Dundreggan so special.

Dundreggan and Glenmoriston are areas rich with Gaelic folklore stretching back through the centuries. The people of the past and the communities who still live here are integral to the information and activities available at the Rewilding Centre, and we're so excited to share some of this area's wonderful stories and tales in our storytelling space, Am Bothan (The Bothy). Our storytelling sessions will help visitors visualise Dundreggan's evolution over the years and understand how and why we should continue to rewild this important area and the wider Scottish Highlands.

Our accommodation building will offer a truly immersive experience, allowing visitors to spend longer exploring Dundreggan. With 20 twin/double bedrooms, boot rooms and a communal area for relaxing after a day's adventure, it's a comfortable and convenient base for those keen to spend multiple days experiencing the Rewilding Centre, wider estate and local area.

Facilities at the Rewilding Centre also include classroom space for educational groups, a large multi-purpose presentation and event space, an accessible outdoor play area and a café offering delicious meals and light snacks using seasonal, locally sourced ingredients.

Centre Director, Laurelin Cummins-Fraser, said: "We hope the Rewilding Centre will inspire people to explore and engage with Scotland's wild places, and we can't wait to welcome our first visitors when we open in April. Only by working with nature can we

positively affect the future, and we hope that by offering experiences that bring people and nature together, the Rewilding Centre will help visitors to connect with the landscape and encourage them to play their own part in protecting the natural world."

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
