

And finally, the work on the road into Kilchuimen Cemetery will also finish soon and hopefully that will protect the road from the river.

Glenmoriston Beastie Trail

Thanks to funding by the Fort Augustus and Glenmoriston Community Company, the new Glenmoriston Beastie Trail is going ahead and should be launched by the end of June. Trail booklets will be available from the local cafes, the Glenmoriston Arms Hotel and shops in Glenmoriston. The modest charge for the booklet includes pencils and sharpeners for completion of the "brass rubbings" of local wildlife on the trail marker posts which are being erected at sites of interest in the glen.

Invermoriston Recreation Field

At present, the terms of the lease state that the recreation field is only to be used for "sports and games facilities" but the Glenmoriston Improvement Group is looking at whether it is possible to to negotiate extending the potential uses of the field so that other activities could be considered, such as a community garden, poly tunnel or allotments for example. Ideas for additional sports and games that could be played are petanque, a 5 or 7 a side pitch rather than the full sized one, shinty, archery, adult sized exercise equipment and, of course, much improved play equipment for children. Once the terms of use of the field have been settled, there will be a full consultation with the community about what people are interested in and willing to organise. 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Stories in the land: the Glen of the Bards

Glenmoriston was home to a succession of Gaelic poets & musicians in the late 18th and throughout the 19th century, known collectively as "The Glenmoriston Bards". These bards wrote songs and poems in praise of Glenmoriston which provide a unique perspective of life in the glen at that time. In 2020, we managed to secure funding from SNH (NatureScot) to employ two skilled researchers (Munro Gauld and Ceit Langhorne) to investigate the Glenmoriston bards. Since that time, Project Manager Joyce Gilbert has been visiting sites in Glenmoriston connected to their report - writing linked blog posts on the GIG Facebook Page which have been regularly viewed by around 100 people. Whilst the blog post has been an excellent way of sharing the research findings (especially during the Pandemic), we feel it will really come alive for the community at public events in the glen.

We are currently hoping to secure funding for a series of events in September, where we will share the findings of the research through a mixed media presentation and historical re-enaction. The presentation will include maps, photographs, music, song and story plus recordings of local people made in 1952 by Calum Maclean of the School of Scottish Studies. Tom Langhorne's outdoor historical re-enactment will give a unique flavour of life in our glens at that time.

Invermoriston War Memorial

The new commemorative bench has been delivered and work is being carried out to give a safer standing area by the War Memorial. This has been funded by FAGC Company and fabricated by GD Stell of Belfast. We are grateful to Pat Dobner for her design, Marion Gillies for the donated slabs, the Glenmoriston Estate for permission to carry out the work on their land and to Thomas Dobner for his hard work in doing the groundworks and making the base

The men, who started non contact training last month have taken part in a few friendlies in the run up to their first league match against Skye, which they won, where a minute's silence was held in memory of the club secretary, Mrs Catherine Cameron, who passed away in March 2020.

The ladies team are back in training but await word from the Women's Camanachd Association as to when games can start.



A lot of changes have taken place, each game and training session must have a Covid officer in place, every item must be sanitised, track and trace forms must be filled in, a set amount of officials at a game and at present **NO** spectators. A different world to what we are used to but we must adhere to these regulations if we want to continue playing our beloved shinty.

Moths and Butterflies of the Glens

Butterflies, like garden birds, are hard not to like. Often beautifully coloured and flitting around wildflowers in the summer-time, they brighten our lives up when we take time to notice them. Out now, are a host of large and gorgeous types known as Nymphalids – the Small Tortoiseshell,

Peacock and Red Admiral, all of which feed as caterpillars on nettles. If you want to have these flying wonders around your garden later on in the year, leave a patch of nettles for the summer. Much smaller but equally stunning, Green Hairstreak, Common Blue and Small Copper butterflies are also about. Watch out for flashes of metallic green, blue and orange respectively.






Most people regard moths with fear and distain. The idea that moths eat your carpets and clothes, or are evil, night flying creepy-crawlies is presented to us from an early age. And while it is true that a handful of moths can be a problem in the house, the huge majority of species are absolutely harmless, spending their time eating plant leaves and sipping nectar from hedgerow flowers. In fact, moths are just night-time butterflies, and many fly during the day, like the Speckled Yellow pictured that I saw in Glen Garry last weekend. Next time someone says moths are boring and grey, show them this!

Many moths do fly at night though, and are difficult to see without catching them. At Dundreggan, I regularly run a light-trap during the night to attract whatever is about. On a good night, it is not uncommon to record 50 different species and hundreds of individuals. Here's one I found in the trap a couple of weekends ago – an Elephant Hawk Moth – large and impressive! That's a normal-sized egg box it's sitting on.





The Great Glen, Glen Garry and Glenmoriston are particularly good for rare and interesting moths. With names like Blomer's Rivulet, Blaeberry Pug, Great Brocade, Rannoch Sprawler and Anomalous (yes – a real name for a moth!) it's hard not to get interested, especially as most of them are really very beautiful when you take a close-up look. I find it endlessly fascinating to think that we share the landscape with such amazing creatures that hardly anyone notices, unless they have a certain curiosity about what lives around us! Blast From The Past

St.Columba's Convent, thereafter called St. Scholastica's Priory

In December 1896, Abbot Leo Linse told the Sisters of St. Scholastica's that they should make an effort to buy the field, which lay between them and the hospital (St. Joseph's Hospital) as "Lord Lovat is going to try and sell this land for houses which would be disastrous for us". The field was then bought by the Bishop.

They also took on nine acres of land belonging to their rented estate and built a stone wall as a new part of the enclosure. Their dream of Iona (a small island on the River Tarff) had to be given up, a spot that they were attached to but the expense caused by the flooding to the wooden fence that had previously been built, rendered it impractical at this time.

The new wall was built by a local contractor, Mr Grant from Invergarry for £90 and a local carpenter was hired for £70 to extend and repair the wooden enclosure.


At the beginning of 1898, the nuns began farming and kept themselves supplied in dairy products, vegetables and chickens. Peter and Duncan (two local men) tried to control the rabbits as they were overrun by them and Peter built a run for the chickens. A German nun, Katherine Sax enjoyed working outside and seemed to be more used to the cold weather in the Highlands than the others who complained of the extreme cold winters and wet autumns.

Peter and Duncan assisted them with the cutting of the corn and they also built a duck pond behind the wall from the road and on sunny days, the nuns enjoyed afternoon teas there. Sister Hildegarde was the beekeeper and an expert in catching swarms. Between planting and harvesting time, they cut and burned acres of gorse in the area around the graveyard, (a small walled cemetery was made in sight of the river and the small hill) where they built a small Calvary. They planted an avenue of trees in 1898 from the Priory to the small walled graveyard, the rest were planted around the hillside as 900 small trees were a gift from Lady Edith Weld who was a relative of Lord Lovat. The graves were removed and interred at the Abbey graveyard in 1972 to make room for new houses.

The Community Company has had a very busy year so far! We've supported some really great projects in the communities through our grants and progress on the new homes has been fairly whizzing along. Read on for all the latest new about our grants, new homes project, the Community Caretakers and more...

Grants

Well this year has certainly been different and many of the grants we had given out have had to be delayed, due to the restrictions imposed by Covid. We were delighted to award a grant to Glenmoriston Improvement Group earlier this year for a commemorative bench for the war memorial, and to set up a "Beastie Trail" to encourage everyone to explore Glenmoriston a bit more.

We are always keen to support applications, so do give us a call if you have an idea for a grant and want to see if it would qualify, or if you need help with working out what is needed. The next round of grant applications will close on the 17th August.

This spring, along with Falck Millennium Wind Farm, we worked with Kilchuimen Primary school (Primary 4 & 5) on what they called their "Mini money fund". The children designed their own grants programme with all the paperwork they needed, invited applications from other pupils and then went through the assessment process to agree which projects they would support, all this while managing a budget.

They did a great job and there were some wonderful projects that have been approved by the children. Primary 1, 2 & 3 have been granted money for sand pit toys and a maths robot, Primary 4 & 5 have been awarded money for a maths/art robot, tennis equipment and a Warhammer starter game to set up an after school club. Finally some pupils from P 5, 6 & 7 put in a bid for a post-covid party for elderly people in the community. We can't wait to see these ideas being put into practice.



New Homes for Old Convent Land

We've had a very busy few months with preparations for the completion of the new homes. In March, the Director's housing subgroup finalised the affordable homes and allocation policies. Due to the enormous interest we received, the application process was split into two stages, with the first set of application packs sent out in April.





When the number of applications had been narrowed down, the second stage of applications was begun in May. Following assessment of these applications by the housing subgroup, offers have now been made to the 12 successful applicants.

We anticipate that the new homes will be completed by late summer, and we are looking forward to welcoming all our

new tenants to their new homes at 'Caledonian Court.' Work on site has really developed over the past few months as each house has taken shape. With the

scaffolding almost gone, I think we can all agree that the new homes look really smart. With work on the interiors nearing completion, the main work in the next couple of months will be landscaping the gardens and shared courtyard space. We hope to include a range of bushes and fruit trees in these areas, and to provide a buffer between the A82 and the homes.





The caretaking team are now back to full strength with all the team now tackling the backlog of jobs created during lockdown.

Brushing, shovelling, blowing and scraping are on the cards for standard village maintenance, as well as the familiar grass cutting regime. The cobwebs have been brushed off the kit and we're ready to go!



Residents and visitors alike should be enjoying a range of new outdoor furniture throughout the villages in the area. Thanks to the HIE Tourism Fund for providing funding for some excellent and much needed new seating and interpretation products to enjoy in 2021.

Out with our standard routine, some planned project work for the team over the next few months will include stone walling, bridge building, fencing, drainage, pole pruning, woodland management, building maintenance and floral planting.

We would also like to thank her for her time as a councillor. Also Sam, our minute taker is resigning and this will be her last meeting; I'd like to thank her for doing the Minutes over the past few years and we are sorry that she is leaving as she'll be a hard act to follow. I would particularly like to thank Stuart for all his help in the background over the past year with planning applications, windfarms, accounts, Invermoriston toilets, attending other meetings and anything else that cropped up. I would also like to thank Cllr Margaret Davidson for her attendance, help and support during the past year and to the other community councillors for attending other meetings in the community. I would also like to welcome David Fraser as one of our new councillors. Also thank you to Harry Whiteside, the Community Company and Maria MacRae, the Glengarry Trust for helping me with the 3 Glens Resilience Group through the pandemic. Over the past year, we have seen the formation of the 3 Glens Home Care providing much needed help to those who need it and 12 houses/flats which are very much needed living accommodation for local young people in particular. The Community Council is delighted with Gavin Steel and Kelton Bennett for keeping us well updated throughout the Scottish Water project over the past two years. 1. Previous Minutes

The Minutes of the meeting on Wednesday 28th April 2021 were agreed to be an accurate and true reflection. Proposed by DM and seconded by HC. Presentation by Scottish Water (SW): Kelton Bennett (KB) provided an update on the Loch Ness Regional WTW. North to South: connection pipework was unable to go ahead on 17th May as planned and has been re-scheduled for early June. Jenkins Park connections are being held back until the North to South work has been completed to reduce customer impact. Raw water intake: will continue on temporary supply until the permanent power supply is available towards the end of June. Water treatment works: will continue on generators until permanent supply is available at the end of June. The new power supply cable has been installed along the Great Glen Way. Hard landscaping will be completed once the temporary generation equipment has been removed. Great Glen Way pipework: a constant low flow rate is now being pumped through the pipeline to the service reservoir. Final inspection of the excavation rock face is planned w/c 24th May. Fort Augustus reservoir: a constant low flow rate is running through the tank, permanent power will be available towards the end of June. Booster pumping stations: primary booster site is almost complete, secondary booster site is also almost complete with power supply works to begin at the end of May. Invermoriston WTW: work ongoing to connect in the supply pipework from the new treatment works. Mechanical and electrical work to start in early June. Choramination: leaflets were delivered to all customers advising of the change that water is treated together with

2. Matters Arising

Invermoriston Toilets: No update, MD to contact Harry Whiteside (Community Company) for update on situation with contract and camper van waste disposal unit. Scottish Water: Monthly report and verbal update provided to the CC. Glenmoriston Access Issues: No update from Access Officer, ongoing.

Campsite: Noise issues ongoing, Robin Fraser at THC aware.

Sheltered Housing: Properties could be ready by end of Sept early October. The sheltered housing will be owned and operated by THC therefor all applicants to ensure they are on the Highland Housing Register. The community properties are allocated by the Community Company. MD would like to put information in the next Ness News about allocation. Kilchuimen Cemetery Road: Work has commenced on site and will take approximately six weeks

3. Police Report

Road traffic issues continue to dominate the demand for Police. The increased number of tourists who do not pay attention to road markings or drive slowly causing frustration in others is an ongoing concern. There was a serious road crash between a van and a lorry that demonstrates the damage that can be caused by driving outwith your lane which resulted in a male suffering life changing injuries.

Parking outside the Chinese takeaway in Fort Augustus has reduced but continues just north of the cones. Persons should continue to be discouraged from doing so and park

elsewhere, the Police will continue to educate offenders.

As more and more people come to Fort Augustus and the pubs and cafés open antisocial behaviour will increase. Licensed premises should ensure they are not supplying alcohol to clearly intoxicated persons. Police have engaged with a number of drunk persons in the village and will continue to do so to ensure this does not become a common theme. There have been no incidents of note, however, as stated above licensed premises should be responsible in the provision of alcohol. Visitors in the village getting drunk and causing noise and or damage will result in Police having to carry out more stringent licensed premises visits in order to combat drunkenness.

The influx in tourists to the village will mean more money coming into businesses and therefore attract thieves. Businesses should ensure they are taking their security seriously to deter thefts. Police will continue to carry out patrols in the area to deter such things and challenge suspects.

People should continue to aware of their surroundings and if they see any activity they believe is suspicious it should be reported via 101 or 999 if urgent.

4. Treasurer's Report

The balance as of today is £5,339.96. The annual accounts have been independently approved.

5. Community Amenity Issues

Car Parks: DM and SF met with Shane Manning (SM), the car park extension should be open by July. DM to contact SM and ask if he can discuss double yellow lines on the A82 with Bear Scotland. MD has spoken to David Devine (DD) of Transport Scotland who advised that the pavements may be completed in September. MD to check with DD to see whether will be doing both sides of the road or just one side. If only one side MD will ask for the side opposite the hardware store to be done first.

Roads: Extension of 40mph speed sign in Invermoriston, Transport Scotland wrote to MD in January and confirmed they had looked at the speed there in 2012 so were not going to review again. MD and DF had a brief meeting with a Police Sgt in Dingwall who was interested in looking at the data to support the application. DM has written to Richard Perry and asked for the most recent data from Invermoriston and The Clansman. Support of the Police is critical as Transport Scotland have advised that without the support of the Police, their hands are tied. Invermoriston are keen to have flashing speed signage installed and also investigate the possibility of a road crossing as people are crossing from the entrance of the car park to the bridge almost diagonally across the road. DM to forward relevant details to DF. DF to add Invermoriston to the 'wildlife' issues as there is a population of red squirrels there. DF to remind DD about double yellow lines and bollards/clearway being installed as Highland cattle are now back in the field opposite Redburn Café.

6. Renewable Energy Projects

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
Contact from Alan Greenwood of SSE about the Cloiche and Bhlaraidh extensions,he is happy to join a Community Council meeting at some time.

A meeting will need to be arranged with Marianne regarding community funding. SF raised concern over the five windfarm developments in discussion all within the area just north of Bhlaraidh, one of which borders Bhlaraidh windfarm where visibility is going to be horrendous. MD to contact the senior planner and review the sites overall and cumulative effects.

Fiodhag Windfarm: Nick Forrest has been in contact wishing to talk about Community benefit.Loch Liath Windfarm: Helen Lafferty has been in contact with the CC and has put information out to the public about the windfarm.

Fort Augustus Substation: JD provided an update of the meeting on the 7th April with SSE regarding their intention to apply for an extension from 25th April to 30th October. SF explained to Zoe Skinner at THC that SSE failed to answer all of the comments previously raised and objected to the reasons that they submitted for the need for an extension and the disruption to the community.

SF has a map which shows that within a five kilometre radius north of Bhlaraidh there

Rachel Hayes has stood down this year, the CC will invite someone from the Glenmoriston area.


Sam Cornelius has resigned so a replacement is being sought for a minute taker. An advert will be placed on Facebook.

There is a sign at the end of the pier saying "Space Reserved for Boats and Paddles" a local parked there and was told he was not permitted to park there? DM to clarify position with SM at THC.

Speeding raised again on the Auchterawe Road, HC suggested a newsletter be issued by SSE so locals are aware of traffic movements etc. SC stated that SSE used to produce a newsletter which was distributed from Three Bridges along the entire length of the Auchterawe Road but that has not been produced for a couple of years now. DM to contact Lisa Marchi (SSE) and ask if the newsletter could be reinstated and also to invite HC to the next Fort Augustus Community Liaison Group Meeting as a second representative of the CC.

The Waterfront lodges near Invermoriston are now called "The Hamptons Loch Ness" and are advertising a helipad for exclusive use by lodge owners and their guests? The community asked in 2019 that the works to upgrade the tracks and bridges in Auchterawe with the funding SSE provided to Forest and Land Scotland (FLS) be undertaken as soon as possible. It was further requested that any attempt to obtain 'double funding' from other partners was not to be pursued. The construction industry has been able to work for some time yet still no upgrades have begun? MD to follow up with FLS.Alan Greenwood is to be invited with a project manager to speak to the CC so questions can be asked about access, water supply and visual impact etc. SF is keen for support with the whole aspects of windfarms as both the South and North side of Loch Ness now have more than 20 windfarms operational or in progress/scoping etc. There are ten applications in the Monadhliath range alone.

Glenurquhart CC are not taking a view on any windfarms in Glen Liath until they have Planning Applications in front of them. They are, however at the scoping stage trying to get as broad as an environmental impact statement as they can, particularly as any turbine over 150m needs to be topped with a red aviation light for air traffic which means they will be visible both day and night. Strathglass are concerned and the CC's are certainly aware of local feeling about windfarms. DF suggested that a workshop be arranged, inviting two representatives from our Community Council as well Strathglass, Glen Urquhart and Foyers CC's due to the concerns raised by all about windfarms. A Planning Officer from THC will also be invited so all relevant information and broader understanding of policies be available to all. Date of next meeting Wednesday 30th June at 7.30 p.m. via Teams.
