
I'd like to thank those who attend our Community Council meetings and to Angela MacCormick for checking that our accounts are in order which was much appreciated.

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Councillor Update

Update from Councillor David Fraser

One of the great pleasures in being a local Councillor is that I get to see corners of our beautiful area that I may not otherwise visit. Recent visits in the area have included the hills above Auchterawe Power Station as preparation for a planning application, Trees for Life at Dundreggan, Kilchuimen School and the Ardachy road. I also attend most of the community council meetings.

ROADS: I am very aware of the parking problems and potholes in Fort Augustus and I am working with the community council on trying to make improvements.

This summer will see the roll out of 20mph speed limits in all of Fort Augustus expect about 400m of the A82 as you travel south. At this stage, Transport Scotland are still refusing to lower the speed limit in Invermoriston. However, once the 20mph limit has been introduced in most villages in the Highland area, I will try again to get it down to 30mph as that will retain the 10mph differential. They are due to report back on the footpath safety audit for the A82 south of Invermoriston. Transport Scotland are working on a design for a new north bound layby between Invermoriston and Drumnadrochit and that is provisionally planned for next financial year.

One of the hazards on the A887 is tourists stopping to photograph the cows and I have asked Transport Scotland for options to make the Redburn area safer.

RENEWABLE ENERGY: We continue to see major renewable power investments in the area including additional windfarms, the proposed pumped hydro scheme at Loch Kemp and connecting infrastructure such as the 400KVA line from Coire Glas. In planning terms, these all get decided at a national level. However, Highland Council are a statutory consultee and will form a view on each one as it comes to planning committee.





Glengarry Shinty Club

It has been a very busy period for the Shinty Club with Youth Shinty in full flow, the juniors have been putting the hard work that they've done over winter into action and it has been a very successful few months.

The primary aged teams have been playing in the Glen Albyn league, with our P2/3 team taking part in a grassroots festival as well.

In 2022, our primary team had a strong season, having reached two finals but losing both. This year, the team were determined to change their fortune and have put an insurmountable effort into training. In May, we travelled to take part in the UHI Cup, taking part in the Plate Competition, coming through the group stages with 6 wins and 2 draws. We met Glenurquhart in the final and having drawn with them in the group stages, we were unsure how the result would go. The game was 0-0 at half time and very close, but our team stepped up a gear and Brooke scored a great goal which won us the trophy. Our first silverware at this level in a very long time!

The primary team also had a good run in the MacKay Cup this year, but that came to an end when they came up against a very strong Newtonmore team. However, this experience has given the team plenty to work towards as they look to improve further.

Our U14's team have also been doing well, playing in the nine-a-side League, we have played four games to date and won. The team has shown great determination and commitment in playing every Thursday and like the primary team, has trained hard in the close season to step their game up another level. We still have some ways to go to match the bigger clubs but for a club of our size, we are doing well. The U14's have been playing some good shinty and scoring plenty of goals.

Our next match is at home to Strathglass, which if anything like our away encounter, it will be an entertaining fixture. Last time, we found ourselves 4-1 down but dug deep to bring the scoreline to 4-4 at this point with Scott at wing centre, collected the ball and pushed it past his marker to then take a strike at goal to scoring to put us ahead for the first time in the match – it was quite a goal! From here the momentum swung in our favour and we went on to win the match 4-7.

The U14 team are hoping they have done enough to qualify for the league semi-finals and really hope to progress to the League Final!

In addition to playing for the U14 team, the girls have also been taking part in the WCA U14 league. This entails teams of six girls meeting at a scheduled venue and playing a round robin tournament. We have played in two rounds to date and have had some good performances against stronger teams and we are certain that our young team has a good future in this league.

The women's team has had a tough season to date; the team are in transition and are allowing our younger girls plenty of game time and experience. This means that we have had some difficult games against strong teams, but the importance of turning up and playing is valuable and we are sure that this team has a good future. The women's team head to Glasgow on 18th of June to meet Glasgow Mid Argyle in the quarter-finals of the Challenge Cup.

The senior team has had some good results of late but injuries have taken their toll on the small squad and made for some tough games too. Without a hit of the ball, we have





reached the semi-finals of the Single Team Club Competition as Strachur-Dunoon withdrew from the quarter-final match against Glengarry. Looking ahead, we'll either meet Aberdeen University or Lochcarron in the semi finals.

There is plenty of opportunity to come along and support the teams with loads of games still fixtured throughout the summer months. Keep an eye on our Glengarry Shinty Club Facebook page for up to date fixtures and results.

Cathie, was born on the 4th of June 1946 at Glen Lyon, Perthshire, daughter of William and Janet Hendry. Part of a large family, she moved to Glen Luie, Invergarry at a young age. Her education began at Invergarry Primary School, then she attended Fort Augustus Junior Secondary School where she became "dux" of the school.

At the age of 12, she left Glen Luie and moved to Faichem to live with Mrs. Cuthbertson. After leaving school, Cathie worked for a while at Tomdoun Hotel,

then joined staff at Glengarry Castle Hotel, where one aspect of her job was to shine the silver teapots which she did until you could see your reflection in them.

In 1962, at the age of 16 she married Leslie, a lorry driver and moved into his Granny MacKenzie's house at 8 Garry Crescent. That year their first son Ian was born, and they moved to 1 Garry Bank, Invergarry, being one of the first residents in the new houses. A new business venture, burger vans started from the house and many a time you would see Cathie out stocking the vans with other family members. Her second son, Steve came in 1974 but tragically she lost both her sons at an early age. In 1996, her beloved granddaughter was born whom she doted on and always looked forward to Holly's visits. In later life, Cathie decided to learn sign language so that she could communicate with Holly and gained several certificates. She even attended the local Brownies one evening and taught them some words.

She always put family first and there was always a warm welcome for visitors at 1, Garry Bank. Cathie love animals especially cats and dogs of which there were many over the years. She also loved music and Cliff Richard was the other man in her life although her "summer holidays" were spent visiting her family in Callander.



Cathie was loved by many especially her granddaughter and will be missed by many.



Barbara Margaret MacDonald Murray was born at Ness View North Kessock on the Black Isle on the 15th October 1930. She grew up in a very rural environment and when it was time to attend **Drumsmittal Primary** School she walked the half mile or so, which was through fields of golden wheat in summer heat or or ice cold wind and driving snow and dark winter skies, her determination always got her there and back. Life was very different then, as time went on she progressed to secondary school, and that determination would be tested again as she had to use a ferry boat to cross the Beauly Firth to Inverness Royal Academy, this journey again varied between mirror like calm waters to guts wrenching

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tossing and turning, yet again her determination got her there.

After leaving school she started work at The Inverness Savings Bank, continuing to cross on the Ferry, she had been seeing a young man from the village called George Murray who was a trainee engineer, their friendship blossomed and on the 4th of April 1956 they were married. Mr and Mrs Murray moved to Fort Augustus as the North Of Scotland Hydro Electric Board required young engineers to work on the new power stations in the glens. The village was expanding with Hydro and Forestry Commission workers arriving. The young Mrs Murray embraced this new life and became involved in the WRVS and many other charity events, always with enthusiasm an that determination. It is around this time she found her secret weapon for persuading others, its called Barbara's Pancake; these were produced in her kitchen on an almost industrial scale and used on many occasions to feed eager councillors and MP's before she pounced and made her demands. Legend has it that the Telford Centre was built in Fort Augustus through the power of Barbara's pancakes. Her commitment to helping others never wavered and was rewarded in 2003 with an MBE for services to charity. Her time with us has sadly passed but she will be remembered for her

infectious smile and determination to help others.



Sandy Russell

Sandy was born in South Laggan, Inverness-shire, on 17th May 1930. His parents both came from rural east Inverness-shire and moved to the area a few years previous. However, Sandy's mother became fatally ill with tuberculosis so, when only two years old, the family went back to Cantray, Croy where he and his sister Margaret were brought up at Hillcrest. Tragically, his father died in 1944 leaving Sandy and Margaret in the care of their Aunty Jean and grandparents. Losing both parents at such a young age, resulted in Sandy growing into the fiercely independent man he became. He did well at Cawdor Public School and commenced a career in forestry work which eventually took him to the Forestry Commission hostel in Fort Augustus, where he met and married Ileen Bain in 1952. They moved into a lovely new house in Jenkin's Park and



then to 29 The Riggs which became the Russell family home before moving to Milton Crescent in Inverness in 1974.

Sandy loved working, and he had a various jobs over his long years, from tree planter, van driver at MacDonald's shop, Forestry Roads operative, Hydro Board electrician, Hydro Electric scheme electrician and ultimately as an electrician at McDermott's, Ardersier which brought him and Ileen to Inverness. He loved the Hydro Scheme work, at Loch Awe and Foyers in particular but McDermott's was his favourite and he enjoyed recalling his work there at every opportunity.

He didn't really have a lot of time for hobbies, but enjoyed working in his garden and pottering about in his shed much to the amazement of Ileen who never knew what he found to do in there!! Sandy loved his cars - and driving them at speed. In fact, up until the grand old age of 91, he was still seen whipping round the Inshes roundabout on his way to Tesco for some much needed supplies! He played badminton in Croy and in Fort Augustus, where he also had a brief dabble in amateur dramatics. He was a very keen Free Mason especially in his later years and reached a high level something of which he was extremely proud.

Sandy and Ileen loved their holidays – especially to

Majorca and the Santa Lucia Hotel in Palma Nova where they splashed on the factor 2 and basted in the hot sun. Their last visit was in 2018 when they were aged 88 and 94 respectively. They loved going down the town on Saturdays, speaking to friends in Marks and Spencer's with a wee stop at the Rannoch on the way home for a couple of large Macllan's and a pint of Guinness. He liked his dram.

Ileen passed away peacefully at home in Inverness on 15th December 2020. It was a huge miss for Sandy after being together for 68 years and his health slowly deteriorated thereafter. But he resisted all attempts to move into alternative care and through the excellent level of care provided for him by NHS Highland's Care and Enablement team and ultimately also Gateway Care, he was able to continue to live as independently as possible in the comfort of his own home. A fact that both Sandy and his family are eternally grateful for.

After a short illness, Sandy passed away peacefully at Raigmore Hospital on 21st April. He leaves behind sister in law Morna Bain, sons Gordon and Malcolm, daughter Angela, four grandchildren, Rory, Gemma, Jacqui and Eilidh and six great-grandchildren, Oran, Aaron, Emily, Callum, Lucy and Will. A long life, lived well by a kind, warm

hearted Highland man.

He will be sorely missed.

Loch Ness TKD played a large part in hosting the International TaeKwon-Do Council's inaugural Scottish Open in April meaning the club's members had extra pressure to perform on the day. And they did not disappoint! LN-TKD are delighted to have Scottish Champions once again in the club.

Local girl Lucy Burnett took the Gold medal for Patterns and fought her way to the Silver medal for sparring. Lucy's division includes competitors who are one or two successful tests away from the coveted First Degree Black Belt, so her divisions are always filled with talented and experienced youngsters; an indictment to Lucy's talent and toughness as a TaeKwon-Do competitor.

LN-TKD's success didn't end there though with brothers Ben and Josh White pushing themselves to bring home some medals. Invergarry lad Josh's determination earned him a gold medal in the Speed Kicking contest. Josh didn't stop there; earning his place in the sparring final, he fought his way to gaining the Silver medal. Josh's opponent in the final was clearly a seasoned competitor but Josh displayed courage and determination by refusing to give way to his experienced opponent.

Ben White, elder brother to Josh, excelled in some tough divisions proving that his training, courage, and strength make him a tough opponent for anyone to face. Ben took the Gold medal for the Patterns in a large division, and the Gold medal for the speed kicking. He wasn't content with that and thoroughly deserved his Gold medal for sparring. Ben's opponent in the sparring final was another experienced and clearly tough competitor. Ben put some pressure on his opponent, keeping him in the corner with ferocious flurries of kicks and punches. His opponent soon lost his cool while Ben kept the match under control; a thrilling match to watch. Ben and Josh then travelled to Motherwell on the 20th May for another Scottish Open Championships with more amazing success, bringing back an array of medals.

Josh excelled himself once again by taking silver for patterns and silver for sparring while Ben also proved himself to be fierce competition by taking the Bronze medals in all three of his categories; patterns, sparring and special technique.

Simon explains "The medals that both boys are bringing home time and again is indicative of their talents and commitment to training. I'm looking forward to seeing their progress in the coming months and years."

1. Previous Minutes

Due to HC having injured her arm, the previous minutes were not available and will be presented at the next meeting.

2. Matters Arising

Glenmoriston Estate: The case is still in the hands of solicitors, ongoing.

Scottish Canals: Email from Ailsa Andrews was circulated regarding Caledonian House, dog fouling and parking problems from guests at the Lock Chambers AirB&B.

Canalside: Parked tour buses are making deliveries difficult and preventing the senior citizens parking near the venue of their lunch club. Potholes are still a problem. The collapsed drain cover and the lighting have been repaired.

Minute Taker: The CC are still seeking a Minute Taker which is a paid position.

- 3. Police Report: No report has been received.
- 4. Treasurer's Report:

The current balance is £4677.32. The cheque for the insurance premium is yet to be cashed.

MA Noted that the CC's remaining assets should be transferred to the Community Company.

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5. Community Amenity Issues:

Public WCs - HC has passed info re income and expenditure to Community Company.

Achnaconeran Road – Road has been repaired. Sign advising vehicles not to use it has been removed.

St Columba's Well - Fence has been repaired.

Footway outside Fort Augustus Gift Co. - The temporary ramp is not a suitable substitute for a proper dropped kerb.

Footbridge between the top car park and playground – Currently being repaired.

Abertarff Bus Shelter – Still not replaced. DF to remind Highland Council.

Bunoich Brae - Fence by Ar Dhachaidh has been repaired.

6. Planning & Licensing

23/00989/FUL Proposed annex for short term letting (retrospective) (resubmission of 22/04296/FUL), Thistle Stop Tea Room, Invergarry. Applicant Mr & Mrs Keith Sturgeon.

The CC had no comment.

23/01484/PNO Erection of agricultural shed (storage of feed and housing animals/460sqm), 500 Metres North Of Netherwood Cottage, Glenmhor, Invergarry. Applicant Mr Archie MacLellan.

23/00970/FUL Installation of a 5m high wind turbine, Land 5300M SW Of Ceannacroc Lodge, Glenmoriston. Applicant Airwave Solutions Ltd

The CC had no comment.

7. Auchterawe Liaison Group

A local resident stated that local residents are unaware of SSEN's preferred route (Option LL-FA 2) for the proposed 400kV line between the proposed Loch Lundie substation and Auchterawe substation and said that the alternative route Option LL-FA 1 would be preferable as it would pass through an area of forestry where the trees have already been felled. There will be a pylon near Torr Dhuin. Preferred route is well used



for leisure activities and SSE have recently given £100k to upgrade paths in the area. DM to visit local residents and arrange meeting. Next Liaison Group meeting 22nd May 7pm at The Lovat.

8. Correspondence

Letters have been received from a resident of Ardachy Road about the speed, size and number of vehicles using the road, the danger to walkers, cyclists and wildlife and maintenance issues. It was further noted in the meeting that the volume of traffic on Ardachy Road is likely to increase when it is made a more attractive short cut by the introduction of a 20mph limit on the A82 through the village and if the Glendoe mountain bike trail development goes ahead. DF to visit road and liaise with Highland Council.

9. AOCB

The Community Council considers that it should have been consulted about the extent of the 20mph speed limit to be introduced on the A82 through the village.

Concerns have been raised locally about the use of the Glendoe airstrip by helicopters in connection with the Coire Glas exploratory works, regarding noise and danger to MOD aircraft. DF stated that Highland Council are currently investigating.

Concern was expressed about the number of temporary traffic lights on the B862 at times when no road works appear to be taking place. DM to liaise with Scottish Water.

The A887 carriageway is collapsing near the Redburn Cafe. DM to contact Bear/Transport Scotland

The next meeting will be directly after the AGM at 7pm to be held on Wednesday, 31st May 2023 at the Memorial Hall, Fort Augustus.


