Alex and Carol started swimming together (socially distanced) at the start of 2021 in Loch Oich soon other ladies were also joining in and the Garry Goons was formed.

At the start, due to lock down, groups were small sticking to the number of families which could meet up and abiding by social distancing rules. As lockdown restrictions eased the number of ladies swimming regularly increased so that now there are about 14 ladies in the group.

Invermoriston Recreation Field – negotiations are ongoing for a new lease between the owner and Highland Council. Funding for a ride on mower has been applied for by GIG to enable local volunteers to cut the grass regularly so the field can be used for play and organised games. Once the lease is in place funding can also be sought for the improved play equipment chosen by the children.

Glen of The Bards – performances by the musical researchers and others will take place at the three community halls in Invermoriston, Fort Augustus and Dalchreichart over the weekend of 20 – 22 May 2022. Free entry and an opportunity to experience a taste of the unique Gaelic music and song that originates from Glenmoriston.

A Glen meeting including the GIG AGM was held at the end of February and well attended. Lively discussions took place about the priorities for the area, some of which will be passed to the Highland Council and Community Council including broadband, the speed of traffic, the need for pavements and a footpath to the burial ground from the car park.

Heritage group in Glenmoriston is being reactivated with a meeting to be held on Thursday 31 March at 2.00 pm in the Millennium Hall and by Zoom. One aim is to improve safety at Columba's Well. There may also be opportunities to arrange other heritage events.

Jubilee celebration events are being planned for the area, including a ceilidh at the Millennium Hall and a "street party" on the recreation field. Thank you to the Community Company for instigating and funding these.

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Glengarry Shinty Club

With the return to competitive shinty upon us, the shinty club's teams have been working hard in pre-season in preparation for the return to our normal league structures. The senior men's team will be back playing in North Division 1, with entry in the MacTavish, Camanachd and Balliemore Cups and the new Single Team Club Cup Competition which will be in its inaugural year.

With a small playing squad, we are often up against it in terms of numbers against other bigger teams, but this cup competition puts against teams of a similar size as ourselves and hopefully will allow a more level playing field in terms of competitiveness. Glengarry Shinty Club has worked hard behind the scenes for many years, in pushing the need for such a competition to the Camanachd Association and we are delighted that this year they have come through.

The men's team are a very committed bunch and with some younger boys training with the team in pre-season, we look forward to seeing them integrate in to the team. The men's team play on Saturdays with our home matches at Craigard.

The women's teams, will compete in the WCA North Division 1 and North Development League, again with a small playing squad; we will see some of our promising U14 girls move in to the women's team. We have an impressive squad of primary girls and our older primary girls will be involved in the Development League and will gain some great experience in the step up to senior shinty. Our women's teams all play on Sundays (with a couple of away Saturday matches) and all home matches are played at Craigard.

The women have been training at the MUGA and have seen amazing numbers with an average of 20 females from ages 10 years upwards enjoying shinty – we have a mixture of abilities and ages so welcome any female wishing to have a go – you can contact us on the Glengarry Shinty Club Facebook page.

Our junior section is going from strength to strength. However, the lack of suitable playing facilities in the winter months has really hindered the children in their training. On the nights we have trained, we have had incredible numbers, with the children desperate to play shinty, the coaches have been blown away by the desire for matches – the more competitive the better as far as the children are concerned! We ran a 'Beginners Session' on the MUGA on Tuesday nights, which proved to be great for integrating children who hadn't played before into the sessions with the experienced players. This is so important for safety reasons as the reality is, our 10 year olds have already been playing shinty for 5-6 years!!! We will be running another Beginners block in Spring when the light nights come in and we move back to the shinty pitch – this information will be posted on the Glengarry Shinty Club Facebook page.

Also on Tuesday nights, we have our very successful P3 & under group – these sessions have been so well attended and the children have positively thrived. With the Club providing in-school sessions for all primary age pupils, we have found that even our youngest P1's are coming to club sessions fully understanding the basics of shinty, so this age group has really benefitted from the in-school sessions.

The group played in their first tournament in a wee friendly tournament with Glenuquhart, which gave them some valuable match experience and a taste of what game situations are like. We are also taking part in another tournament in Fort William on 4th March, so the children are very much looking forward to this experience.







Our older children – the P5 group, played in the Lochaber area first shinty Indoor National Final Qualifiers the other week. Despite the lack of indoor facilities to train on, our team did us very proud – with some of the team playing indoor for the very first time – they won 2 matches, drew 2 and lost 2 so not a bad result all things considered. Our P7 group also took part in their age group qualifiers and put in a very good performance against bigger teams, with only two P7's we were always going to be up against it but we, as always, gave everything and that is all you can ask.

Neither of our Age Group teams qualified for the National Finals but it was a good measure for both coaches and players to see where they are in terms of other teams, we know what work we need to put in and the children are determined that next year's qualifiers will be the best yet!


With our Primary and U14 Group competitions due to start in a month or so, there will be some hard work put in at training to be ready but one thing the children are not afraid of is the hard work required to better themselves as shinty players.

The Club are indebted to our junior coaches: Elaine, Shaun, Shaina and Suzi, with Andy assisting and gaining experience pre-coaching qualification. These guys put in a load of work and commitment week in week out, all year round. Some weeks we have coaches out 4 nights a week as well as playing themselves at the weekend – that is commitment and something we are exceptionally proud of as a small volunteer club. In addition to this, we are especially grateful to Elaine, Suzi and Andy who took time off from their employment to volunteer and offer the in-school sessions in the two primary schools and the Academy.

There has been a real step up in the performances on the park from all age groups and every session we are impressed by the desire and hard work put in by the children. We feel this is in direct correlation to the in-school sessions in which the coaches are covering basic skills with complete beginners and allows the more experienced players extra time to work on polishing up those skills – which means by the time club sessions come round in the week, they are a step ahead! The most asked question at all Junior Sessions is "when is our next game?"!

As always, as a small volunteer club, in a small community, we are always on the look out for more help. We appreciate there is now a lot of people now living in our communities, who may not know or understand shinty but it is a great way to meet new people and become involved in a very active part of your new community. Blast From The Past

Auchterawe / Strathoich

Before the acquisition of the ground at Auchterawe for forestation and nursery cultivation by the Forestry Commission in 1920, the land at Auchterawe was farmland managed by Borlum Farm with the employment of three men. The farm manager lived in Auchterawe House (dated 1870) and there was a total of eight inhabitants. It was all excellent arable ground and was also the site for the first Golf Course in the village before it was relocated to Market Hill, for the development of the nurseries in 40 acres and a well used shinty pitch.

The nurseries employed eighty people in seasonal work from March to September and forty people in the winter months, bedding young plants to mature enough to be transported all over Britain.

There were eight houses with small holdings built around 1920 with no accurate date. My grandfather was the first employee of the Forestry Commission and grew vegetables and flowers which he sold to the local hotels and shops. Even small holders got five fruit trees from Lord Lovat, some that are still bearing fruit and he also kept goats for milk. A variety of army huts were used, one as an office and the one beside it was for the family of an office worker.

Further up there were a further four army huts, one previously used as a Scottish Youth Hostel was the cookhouse and the camp for workmen, one was divided in two for workers and their families, two other 60ft army huts were for two more families. Everyone living in Auchterawe had hobbies and were very active playing in a band or shinty, the ladies at the WRI and whist drives. There was a recreation hall as you cross the burn beside the Forestry bothy and it was well used for all activities. The small wooden house recently demolished was owned and occupied by the Forestry. The old burial ground of St Moula's dates back to St Columba's time lies below Torr Dhuin (the vitrified fort) and just round the corner was the sanitorium which was an

initiative of Lady Lovat and opened in 1907 but that's a story of its own.






Richard John Allen, Glengarry Lodge, Faichem, Invergarry died on 5th December, 2021 aged 77 years old with his wife, Helen by his side.

Nature Notes

I thought I'd give you all a rest from my own ramblings about Nature so I've selected a few choice folklore references to Scotland's native trees on Trees for Life's website. You can find more interesting facts and tales at www.treesforlife.org.uk.Most of the text was written by Paul Kendall with some minor edits from me. Enjoy!

Scot's Pine

Scots Pine has a long and rich history in mythology. In The Golden Bough, James Frazer relates various stories involving pine trees from classical mythology, which may or may not have been Scots pines, such as how the ancient Egyptians buried an image of the god Osiris in the hollowed-out centre of a pine tree. He writes that "it is hard to imagine how the conception of a tree as tenanted by a personal being could be more plainly expressed." As a symbol of royalty the pine was associated with the Greek goddess Pitthea, and also with the Dionysus/Bacchus mythology surrounding the vine and wine making, probably as a fertility symbol. Worshippers of Dionysus often carried a pine-cone-tipped wand as a fertility symbol and the image of the pine cone has also been found on ancient amulets as a symbol of fertility. For the Romans the pine was an object of worship during the spring equinox festival of Cybele and Attis. As an evergreen tree the pine would also have symbolised immortality.

The oldest known living Scot's pine trees in Scotland are at Glen Loyne, near Glen Garry. They have been measured at 550 years old in 1997, making them around 573 years old now - they were young seedlings in 1447!

Birch

At the end of the last ice age, the humble birch tree would have been one of the first trees to begin colonising the ice-scoured landscape. Hence, in botanical terms the birch is referred to as a pioneer species. Similarly in early Celtic mythology, the birch came to symbolise renewal and purification. Beithe, the Gaelic for birch, is the first tree of the Ogham, the Celtic tree alphabet. It was celebrated during the festival of Samhain (what is now Halloween in Britain), the start of the Celtic year, when purification was also important. Bundles of birch twigs were used to drive out the spirits of the old year. Later this would evolve into the 'beating the bounds' ceremonies in local parishes. Gardeners still use the birch besom, or broom, to 'purify' their gardens. Besoms were also of course the archetypal witches' broomsticks, used in their night-time flights, perhaps after the use of extracts of the fly agaric mushrooms commonly found in birchwoods!

Rowan

The rowan is also prominent in Norse mythology as the tree from which the first woman was made, (the first man being made from the ash tree). It was said to have saved the life of the god Thor by bending over a fast flowing river in the Underworld in which Thor was being swept away, and helping him back to the shore. Rowan was furthermore the prescribed wood on which runes were inscribed to make rune staves. In Scotland the rowan has a long and still popular history in folklore as a tree which protects against witchcraft and enchantment. The physical characteristics of the tree may have contributed to its protective reputation, including the tiny five pointed star or pentagram on each berry opposite its stalk (the pentagram being an ancient protective symbol). The colour red was deemed to be the best protection against enchantment, and so the rowan's vibrant display of berries in autumn may have further contributed to its protective abilities, as suggested in the old rhyme: "Rowan tree and red thread / make the witches tine (meaning 'to lose') their speed".



COMMUNITY COMPOSTING

A common issue that has come up time and time again, is that residents struggle to dispose of their garden waste in a responsible manner. We have had many requests over the years to uplift grass clippings, hedge cuttings, branches etc, so it was time for more of a sustainable approach to be adopted by the Community Company.

The decision was made by the Directors to allocate a community composting space in one corner of the Old Convent land. The Caretaker team took the challenge up and have constructed some substantial composting bays to produce leaf mould, wood chip mulch and general compost. All the above will eventually be products we can use throughout the villages, to feed our floral displays, suppress unwanted weeds or just to improve the soil quality of our raised beds.

The team will use this area on a regular basis, but more importantly we want to encourage all interested residents to use the area to dispose of their own garden waste themselves and contribute to future composted products.

The location of the community composting area is just past the entrance to the homes at



Caledonian Court, down the Kilchuimen Cemetery road; you take the first left after the new houses and follow the small circular road into the community field. This will lead you directly to the composting bays that you can drive right next to. We would encourage the site to be used responsibly and garden waste such as grass clippings, leaves, soil, dead flowers, hedge clippings, branches, even your Christmas tree can all be recycled here. The caretaking team will chip all larger branches and hedge clippings etc to make a usable wood chip mulch. However, please do NOT put any food waste in the bays.

A massive thank you must go to MGL Contractors (Morgan) for donating road surfacing materials, over 4 tonnes were donated to upgrade the entrance for which we are massively grateful. The Caretaker team will continue to maintain the road throughout the year. Should anyone have any questions regarding the new facility please contact the Community Company office. Lastly, do enjoy using the composting area, we really hope it proves popular.

4. Treasurer's Report:

A cheque for Ness News of £1440 was cashed on 4th February

£1500 is ring fenced for the interpretation board and the account stands at £3820.49. Felix will put on the agenda at the next Community Company meeting, the possibility of taking over funding the Ness News.

5. Community Amenity Issues:

Glenmoriston: DF brought up road safety issues, Torgoyle bridge, footpath and layby would be granted and that has been written into the requirements for the SNCN and DF got in touch with Transport Scotland to also get involved.

Rock Falls on A82: DF asked for people if they see even small rock falls near or on road to get in touch so professionals can keep an eye on it.

Double yellow lines outside Richmond House Chinese Restaurant: DM brought up that people are still parking right outside the Chinese; a permanent traffic arrangement was brought up and everyone seems to agree to let that go ahead.

IM said that it was agreed in a previous meeting to repaint the line that's there and then we can then also put in a permanent traffic arrangement as the road traffic order can take months to go through.

6. Renewable Energy Projects

Culachy Wind Farm:

RB and KL presented:

They gave an overview of the up-and-coming wind farm at Culachy, and the plans so far are at a very early stage.

They talked about the visibility and access issues that were brought up by public and previous meetings.

Visibility wise they are hoping to have no visibility from the main carpark in Fort Augustus.

MD brought up that the forestry tracks on the Great Glen Way would be high enough to possibly see the wind farm which has been an issue raised in the past and is something



JD brought up if aviation lighting will have to be used on the turbines due to being 220m tall. RB said that they will be in touch with the Civil Aviation Authority about this and suggested possibly having a cardinal scheme where only some of the turbines are lit not all of them however it is still very early stages and there isn't yet an agreed lighting scheme.

The access route they are wanting to use will have two forms of access they will be getting their blades brought up from Kyle of Lochalsh so coming along the A87 and then the A82 and the towers will be coming from Corpach, Fort William which will also be coming up the A82.

They would like to work more closely with the community and create the best community benefit fund that would suit us.

A request for a Scoping Opinion has been submitted to the Scottish Ministers by ITP Energised Limited on behalf of Fred Olsen Renewables Limited in respect of the Culachy Wind Farm proposal.

They will have their first round of exhibitions on the 20th of April at Glengarry Community Hall, and also on the 21sl April at Fort Augustus Village Hall 11am - 8pm.

Felix from the Community Company came on to talk about the Platinum Jubilee Weekend happening from the 2nd - 5th June where funds are available from the 3 Glens Resilience Recovery Fund to help any groups wanting to put on a function for the Jubilee Weekend. A few suggestions were shared, one suggestion was having an event at Invermoriston and possibly putting the Trooping of the Colour on the big screen and have teas and coffees, and then having the same kind of event in Fort Augustus in the afternoon for soup and sandwiches.



Another idea that was brought up for the 3rd was where some trees had been felled in the Convent Wood due to being unsafe and there were plans on turning them into wooden seats to have around the area in the Convent which could be used to give the youngsters a picnic type event.

Street Parties were also discussed for Abertarff, Jenkins Park, Caledonian Court, Riverside Park and The Riggs; Each of these events would have their own budget.

He will come back at a closer time to discuss further but these were just ideas that were put forward to see what other people think about such events that weekend.

DM has been struggling to get the bank signatories changed since MA is now Treasurer. It's been difficult to get in touch with the bank for any help in this matter and might possibly start looking into a new bank account.

Caledonian House seemed to be looking a mess, will get in touch with Caledonian Canals.

HC brought up the subject of the campsite (Loch Ness Highland Resort) again and how loud things have been. Felix offered to bring it up at the next Community Company's meeting and invited DM and HC.

JW received an email about possibly getting faster broadband and has asked them for a full breakdown of costs to cover the Glenmoriston area and that will could come back in up to 60 days. DF brought up some of the difficulties that these schemes can cause and possible other options residents could choose.


