We are responsible for distributing community benefit funds from the Millennium windfarm and the Stronelairg Community Fund. We also manage the funds for a small Hydro project in the South Laggan area. We have supported many projects over the years from the infamous Glengarry fireworks evening, to the Glengarry Community Hall heating project, various clubs and groups for children and adults and also a large number of students.

We hold meetings to discuss grant applications four times a year with the meetings held on the second Monday of June, September, December and March. Closing dates for applications are always three weeks before each meeting on the Monday and the cut-off point is 5pm on that day.

If you are a community group, organisation or individual furthering your studies we would be delighted to hear from you. Community benefit funding is available and it is our job to make sure it reaches those people and groups that need it.

Additionally, the Glengarry Trust, Fort Augustus & Glenmoriston Community Company and Stratherrick & Foyers Community Trust run a joint apprenticeship scheme to support young people within the three community council areas of Fort Augustus & Glenmoriston, Glengarry and Stratherrick & Foyers.

2020 saw the formation of a new voluntary community group in Glenmoriston, snappily acronymed GIG (Glenmoriston Improvement Group)! No sooner was the group in place when lockdown hit. Nevertheless, GIG has managed a few developments, supported by funds from Fort Augustus and Glenmoriston Community Company:

War Memorial improvements.

Glenmoriston Estate, who own the land around the memorial, have given approval to erect a commemorative bench and to stone-chip the area where people stand. This will help in 2021 to make the Remembrance Day events safer and more accessible.

# **Christmas Lights**

The small garden area near to the Millennium Hall was the site for a display, which was designed after consultation with local children. It featured coloured rope lights, Star, Snowmen and Deer, Candy Canes, Wise Men and Angels along with Golden Christmas 4

tree shapes outside the hall on the A82. Next year we plan to light the row of trees alongside the car park, once we get permission to access the electricity supply there. Many thanks to the Glenmoriston Millennium Hall Committee, who allowed us to use their electricity to bring a smile and much-needed cheer to our community.

Since March 2020, the 3 Glens Resilience has been working in the communities of Fort Augustus, Glenmoriston and Glengarry to provide support to those who have been affected by the pandemic, providing a range of services. From the start we have been blessed to have such a dedicated group of volunteers who have really made a difference in their communities. Their hard work has enabled so much to be done. Over the year, we have



delivered prescriptions, shopping and 228 larder boxes and provided sanitiser stations for the communities. We've also provided a range of grants, organised café sessions in Fort Augustus Village hall, provided technology to allow people to stay in touch during lockdown and distributed 2200 hot meals



through our Meals on Wheels initiative. To help with this we were also able to secure funding for a new cooker for Glengarry Community Hall, something which will serve the community for years to come. So all in all, a busy year!

It goes without saying that none of this would have been achieved without the dedicated hard work of our volunteers. We'd also like to take this opportunity to thank all our funders who have been so generous and helpful during a very difficult time. 
## **Business Group**

Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme- extended until 30 April 2021.

**Self-Employment Income Support Scheme**- Details about the fourth grant will be announced on 3 March 2021

**VAT Deferral**- VAT payments due between 20 March 2020 and 30 June 2020 can now be paid over a number of monthly instalments (up to a maximum of eleven) but all instalments must be paid by the end of March 2022. Deadline 21 June 2021. For more information, contact HMRC on 0800 024 1222.

**HMRC Time to Pay Service**- If you cannot pay your tax bill on time because of Covid-19, you may be able to delay it without penalty using HMRC's Time to Pay service. Call the HMRC Helpline on 0800 024 1222.

**Statutory Sick Pay Rebate**- Allows small and medium-sized businesses and employers to reclaim Statutory Sick Pay paid for sickness due absence due to COVID-19. Visit www.gov.uk for more information.

**Local Authority Discretionary Fund**- If your business is still being adversely impacted by Tier 4 restrictions (and you have not received any support), you are eligible to apply. www.highland.gov.uk/coronavirus

**Non-Domestic Rates Relief (Specific Sectors)**- Rates holiday for 2020/21 tax year. Retail, hospitality, leisure and aviation businesses will have their relief extended for at least an additional three months beyond the original date of 31 March 2021. You do not need to apply for this relief. It will be applied to your bill by your Highland Council. Contact Highland Council for more information.

**VAT: reduced rate for hospitality, holiday accommodation and attractions**- Allows VAT registered businesses to apply a temporary 5% reduced rate of VAT to certain supplies relating to hospitality, hotel and holiday accommodation and admissions to certain attractions, that are made between 15 July 2020 and 31 March 2021. Well - that was cold! Snow that arrived before Christmas is still with us in mid-February, and although we have dodged the large falls further east, the length and intensity of this cold snap (apparently caused by Sudden Stratospheric Warming in the high atmosphere above the Arctic) has been exceptional. We are able to fend off the cold in our centrally heated houses and using extra layers of clothes (my long-johns are welded on!), but spare a thought for animals and plants who must survive outside all the time. Upper-most in my mind are the effects on deer. With the higher hills deep in snow, deer have been pushed downhill into the woodlands and fields trying to find food. At Dundreggan, they have spent the last few weeks desperately scraping snow away from whatever grasses and other plants they can find and are spending as much time as possible in the shelter of the woodlands here. On my lockdown daily walk, I'm coming across red and sika deer at all times of the day. They seem much less nervous than usual in this sort of weather, and it is sometimes possible to get pretty close to them if you are careful to approach from the down-wind side of them and don't make too much noise. Their sense of smell is superb of course, but in very cold, still weather they are less likely to sniff you out. Once they do see you, they are much less likely to charge away out of sight and quite often will stand and stare, just keeping an eye on you. I think this is because they need to conserve all their energy just to keep warm, so will only run off if they absolutely have to.

Some birds too stick out the winter with us and I often marvel at how such wee beasties as blue tits, robins and wrens are able to keep warm in minus double digit temperatures. Wrens, one of our smallest birds, have a neat trick to keeping warm they roost together at night, forming little gangs at dusk and squeezing into a tree hole or an old house martin nest to coorie into each other. By contrast in the spring, they are fiercely territorial, so it must be quite a shock to be up close and personal with other wrens during this cold snap.

Up on the hills, there is very little activity although ravens are preparing for the coming nesting season already. These hardy birds will be hatching chicks in March which means eggs sometimes in February – yes, they'll soon be laying! I also noticed activity on our nearest black grouse lek over the last few weeks and even managed to capture them using a trail camera. It's hard to imagine how such animals glean enough food from the wintery landscape to sustain themselves but they manage - Nature has a way!

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# **Glengarry Community Woodlands: Eco-tourism at the community woodland**

When the community set up Glengarry Community Woodlands in 2015, it had to demonstrate there was a plan to manage the woodland in a way that would generate income. This was not only important to satisfy the usual financial commitments that come with owning property, but also to fund the very things that the community said it wanted to use the woodland for - new paths, courses, education programmes and clubs. But what was most important to the public agencies who helped hand the publicly owned woodland over to the community was the opportunity it presented for economic regeneration. The gradual withdrawal of traditional employment sectors such as forestry, hydro, and agriculture has changed the economies and make-up of small communities like Glengarry. Management of the community woodland has to take this situation on board - and try - where possible to plug the gap by creating jobs and contributing to the local economy where it can.

# Why tourism?

The idea for a tourist business was core to the community's case for purchasing the woodland in 2015. The woodland has a lot going for it – its very attractive, with scenic views across the Glen and up to Ben Tee, and its located on some of the major Highland tourist routes. Tourism was identified early on as the best way the community could use the woodland to generate income and create new jobs. So for the last 2-3 years, we have been carefully planning a business which – once operational – will secure the community woodland financially, create new jobs, and offer something that is currently unavailable in the area.

# The business concept

The concept of the business is simple: it will offer an authentic forest cabin experience for quests, in 8 spacious, well-designed, off-grid wooden cabins. Guests will have to walk for 5-10 minutes into the woodland to get to their cabins, each with its own compost toilet and wood burning stove for heating and simple cooking. The cabins will be spacious and fitted out to high standards to ensure that they are comfortable and cosy. Guests will have access a new fully serviced amenity building with wifi & charging points, hot showers, flushing toilets, kitchen and lounge facilities. The office and guest reception will be situated within the old forestry depot which was renovated last year as part of an initial phase of capital works.

### Cabin designs

To achieve the designs we were looking for, we chose to work with one of Scotland's leading timber building architects at North Woods Design & Construction (Ullapool) who created a bespoke cabin design for us.

The next step is to raise the finance and start construction, with an aim to be operational as soon as we can. The success of this community owned business, will secure the future of the community woodland. It will allow us to put into practice some of the ideas discussed by the community back in 2014/15, such as new paths, guided walks, information panels etc. The new business will also play a major part in justifying the public resources that were invested in the community to give Glengarry the ₩odland back in 2015.



The Community Company has had a very busy few months with lots of grants approved, new apprenticeships started, and the continued work on the new homes project, as well as supporting the 3 Glens Resilience Group with their work. Read on to find out more...

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# **Apprenticeships**

Full-time college or university not for you? Would you prefer to earn while you learn? With an apprenticeship you can do just that. We met with Cameron Findlay, who recently completed his 4 year electricians apprenticeship with MacRaild and Smith, to discuss how his apprenticeship has made a difference for him.

There are many reasons for choosing to do an apprenticeship rather than going on to full-time college or university. For Cameron, it was pretty simple. "I wanted to earn some money, and I wasn't too keen on school. I prefer learning on the job, so an apprenticeship seemed the right route to take." An apprenticeship allowed him to do just that. Following two years of block release at college, there was then a year of working on the job before taking the all-important final exams.

Learning on the job has great advantages, but the college side of things is also important. As Cameron says, "You might think that just because it's an apprenticeship and not full-time university it's going to be easy- but it's not. There's a lot of studying and work that you need to put in to pass the exams." Certainly there is a lot of commitment and hard work involved if you want to successfully complete your apprenticeship.

"Some of the college tests and exams could be hard, but I preferred the on the job learning" Cameron says. And learning on the job is something he's had plenty of. During his apprenticeship he worked on everyday domestic maintenance jobs, as well as large scale jobs such as the 26 new houses on Belford Road, Fort William; a new office for Fergusons Transport in Corpach and the new MacBrayne Apartments on Fort William High Street. "The new flats were probably the most challenging," Cameron explains, "There was a lot of complex work needed for the lift system." From lifts to lights, it's all in a day's work for an electrician.

If you're considering an apprenticeship, or are a new apprentice yourself, Cameron has this advice- "Stick at it. You need to work hard at it if you want to succeed, and it won't necessarily be easy. You might find all the studying and exams difficult, but it's a great reward at the end of it."

### **New Homes for Old Convent Land**

Over the last year we've made a lot of progress despite delays caused by Covid-19. Before lockdown, we hosted an open day where you voted 'Caledonian Court' as your name of choice for the new street and we were able to confirm this with Highland Council allocating the name to us in September.



Work began on site in June, thanks to all the work done in preparation by the project team during lockdown. Compass were awarded the contract in April, and were raring to go. In the last nine months they've transformed the site and the new homes are really taking shape.

A lot of thought and work has been put in by the project team and the Director's housing sub group to ensure that the designs of the different houses fit the community's needs. There will be a range of house types, including 2 bungalows which are suited for anyone with mobility issues. To keep all the homes energy efficient and cost effective to heat, each property is fitted with an eco-dan air source heat pump.



The directors have been busy reviewing the allocation process, and application packs will be prepared shortly. These will be available in March. # **Glenmoriston Toilets**

As many of you will know, the Millennium Hall in Glenmoriston had to close their toilets to public use due to problems with the septic tank and soakaway. The lack of a public toilet facility led to many local problems in the surrounding area.

For the last few months, a substantial amount of work was put into a joint bid to the Rural Tourism and Infrastructure Fund (RTIF) to upgrade the toilet facility at the Millennium Hall and to replace the toilets over at Foyers. The upgrade at the Millennium Hall included a new septic tank, soakaway, pump and internal improvements to the toilets themselves to make them COVID compliant and more environmentally friendly. Also included was the installation of a waste disposal point for motor homes in the car park. In parallel to work on the bid, discussions were also taking place with the Highland Council regarding the long term maintenance and management of the facility

Despite many hours of work and an incredibly detailed bid, the submission to RTIF was only partially successful. It is currently on a waiting list to see if schemes who have been offered funding fail, in which case we should be successful in securing funds. We will know soon if that is the case.

However, in parallel to the bid to RTIF we had bid for and secured funding from Fern Community Funds and also from Fort Augustus and Glenmoriston Community Company. After much discussion, an alternative plan was put forward to use these funds to undertake the essential works to the septic tank etc which would allow the toilets to be opened to the public as a stage 1 project. If RTIF does offer funding, this would then allow stage 2, the upgrade to the toilets, to take place.

As we go to press, work is being undertaken behind the scenes to secure all the detailed permissions, costing and tenders to get to the point where stage 1 can go ahead.

There is still a lot of work to do to make the project happen but we are cautiously optimistic that we may be able to start on site this year.

Thanks go to the many people and organisations involved in the project to date - the Millennium hall committee, the community of Glenmoriston, Stuart Findlay, Highland Council, Harry Whiteside, FAGCC, Fern Community Funds, Morham and Brotchie, Kearney Donald Partnership and more.

Draft Minutes of the Fort Augustus and Glenmoriston Community Council Meeting held on Wednesday 27th January 2021

### 1. Previous Minutes

The Minutes of the meeting on Wednesday 25th November 2020 were agreed to be an accurate and true reflection. Proposed by SF and seconded by JD.

Update on ETAPE: Malcolm Sutherland (MS) advised that ETAPE Loch Ness that was planned for the end of April has today been postponed. It was now guite clear that there was absolutely no chance that an event of this kind could take place. A contingency date of Sunday 22nd August has been agreed with the relevant parties. All participants will be automatically rolled over to that date although they will have the option to either get a refund, donate their entry fee to MacMillan Cancer Support or defer to April 2022. SF raised concerns about the date in August. MS stated that he has been speaking to other Community Councils both before and since Christmas, as well as business people and he thinks people are desperate just to get back to a level of normal. The event will follow all British and Scottish Government advice and there is no way that the event would take place if there is any fear for the community or participants. Other planning for the event includes: a degree of social distancing, starting the event 15 minutes earlier which allows for a greater spread of people from the start which assists on progress during the course and also a reduced number of participants. The exact numbers would be dependent on what participants choose following today's announcement. There would be an increase in the number of aid stations, on previous events there were three stations. They would no longer be feed stations as the participants would receive their food and sustenance the day before the event and be self-sufficient on the day. There would be medical support, portaloos and mechanical support and there would be a contingency of water for those who couldn't carry enough. The event would relocate to Bught Park where greater spacing is available. SF was concerned by the August date due to the possible increase of tourist numbers (domestic) if foreign holidays are not allowed and English schools are still on holiday. MS had spoken to other communities who recognise that it is an extraordinary time and an extraordinary year and he thinks people are simply desperate and if everything is sitting correctly for an event like this to take place it would be a reason for celebration but he appreciates that the area hopefully will be busier and will be operating as normal, well as near normal as possible. There may also be reduced foreign tourism levels. SF asked if they had considered moving the event to September. MS stated that the Loch Ness Marathon is on the 3rd September which would close the roads on the south side twice in a month, massive number of marshals and volunteers needed around the loch; at the moment there is six-week separation and that is considered tight for volunteer fatigue and also daylight is an issue. Presentation by Scottish Water: Kelton Bennett (KB) gave a quick update on the project.

- •At the raw water intake there are still some civil works to be undertaken which should be completed within the next few weeks. There remains a temporary generator that is being used for operating the pumps as the permanent power supplies are not yet finished.
- •At the water treatment work site itself, the commissioning work is going pretty well, the first part of the chemical dosing is mostly completed. There are still some civil works to finish including a couple of chambers on the Great Glen Way. The works to repair the landslip is pretty much completed which just leaves the final tie. The pipes have already been tested so the reinstatement in its entirety will then be checked before the Great Glen Way is re-opened.
- •The civil works at the service reservoir are mostly complete and the power supply cabling is due to start from the 8th February, there are about four weeks of ducting work to do from the burn crossing down towards Fort Augustus and up the hill into the service reservoir site.
- •The pipeline works in the village is virtually complete and the work at Lovat Terrace is ongoing. There is a final connection date with the Networks team on the 10th Feb.
- The booster pumping station work should be starting about the 8th Feb, initially with the clearing of sight lines along the road, then construction of the new access junction into the site before any of the actual development can take place. Booster Pymping Station 2 commences on 8th Feb and then three to four weeks after that work,

commences on Booster Pumping Station 1. There may be some overlap for tree felling for sight line clearance. DM said that the no one had approached Girvans Hardware Store to advise that the traffic lights were on the road longer than they were initially told. KB stated that there had been an issue with the power plant and apologised that no one had notified them.

# 2. Matters Arising

Invermoriston Toilets: MD stated that the Hall didn't get an award even though they met all the necessary criteria; unfortunately, the fund ran out of money. They are now on a reserve list and there will be a Scottish Government Financial Statement tomorrow and they may make an announcement of putting more money into it. Fergus Ewing was bidding to get £10M but they only got £3M. Both Invermoriston and Foyers bids were successful. There have been efforts to find a fallback position in case we don't get the go ahead by the end of February. Beinneun have confirmed that the outside septic tank can be installed with the £100,000 that they donated which should also cover a tidy up of the toilets but not the fundamental refit of the toilets that were planned. The Community Company also had £20,000 contingency for the Hall. MD is hopeful that something will be in place by July.

Scottish Water: Monthly report provided.

# 3. Police Report

Incidents between 25 Nov 20 and 24 Jan 21:

There have been 8 fixed penalty notices issued to drivers travelling in excess of the speed limit within Fort Augustus over this period. A prohibition notice was provided to one driver due to a dangerous trailer which was being towed through Fort Augustus. A 30-year-old woman was arrested on the 28th of November on the A82 near to Invermoriston for driving whilst controlled drugs were in her system. She was released later on with instruction to appear at court at a later date for the offence. On the 31st of December 2020, a 31-year-old man was found in possession of a small amount of cannabis within a vehicle on the A82 south of Fort Augustus. He was issued

amount of cannabis within a vehicle on the A82 south of Fort Augustus. He was issued with a recorded police warning and also instructed to return home as he was in breach of COVID regulations.

On the 20th of January 2021 there was a report of a theft of sporting equipment from outside a flat in the Abbey, Fort Augustus. Police are following a positive line of enquiry and appears to be an opportunistic crime with no wider concerns.

### 4. Treasurer's Report

The balance as of today is £5,775.96.

### 5. Community Amenity Issues

Ward Boundaries: The CC submitted a letter and received a copy letter from Rev. Dr. Adrian Varwell which has been acknowledged.

Car Park: An agreement has been reached with both parties and is now sitting with the solicitors.

Roads: Patch work has been undertaken at the canal bridge, Richmond House and throughout the village. One of the culverts at Aberchalder has also been done and will return to finish the other one. No update on the section at Inchmore where RH thinks there isn't enough signage. SF has travelled the road and thinks there is sufficient signage.

DM stated that there is a really deep pot hole on the road up Glendoe between the Keepers Cottage and the cattle grid. IM commented that the state of the road below the Keepers Cottage is also in a terrible state and has been for a long time, minor repairs have been done previously but they don't last. The Ardachy road from Glendoe side is falling away and also have deep rutted verges but is not so bad after the Ardachy bridge

heading towards the A82. Both sides of the canal are terrible and also there's pothole outside 4 and 10 The Riggs. MD asked DM to send an email to John Taylor and cc herself and Alan Johnstone. There is water going over the road before Inchewan and a really rough patch at the corner after, going northbound into Invermoriston. Sheltered Housing: They have started the groundworks at the Telford Centre, MD to get the plans of the Telford footprint to understand what is going on in there to see what we can do to speed things up and also to have a discussion with the NHS just to move it on a bit. The other houses came up at the Community Company AGM; they won't now be ready until July. Question as to whether there were many on the Council housing waiting list, MD said some but not many. Some people on the list with the Community Company are not on the Council list. MD has spoken with John McCarthy about another batch of housing in the village and he is looking at some land. DM states that some people are having difficulty using the Council's online housing application form, the paper form seems much easier, and the online application may put some people off. There are a lot of young people who are on the list with the Community Company but not on the Council list so the applicants will be asked to go on the Council list too. Allocation policy is yet to be decided by the Community Company; it won't be on points but more local focused. Julie Vivers (Head of Housing) is keen to see if we can get more than one move and more than one house for people coming out of bigger Council houses and she will discuss that with the Community Company.

Kilchuimen Cemetery: The cemetery road has been inspected and flood engineer Kenny Carmichael believes it will need gabion baskets and concrete slabbing to hold it into the road which is very expensive. MD is drafting a letter to Rob MacDonald and also to John MacLean who runs the cemeteries who is going to talk to Jim Sandeman. The project is being taken seriously due to the state of deterioration.

Invermoriston Cemetery: MD confirmed that the gate had been re-hung so believe that the issues are all resolved.

# 6. Renewable Energy Projects

Fiodhag Windfarm: Previously known as Fasnakyle, the environmental impact studies are ongoing but there is no update. Cloiche Windfarm: No update. Glenshero: Waiting on the outcome of the appeal. Corrie Glas: No update. Dell Windfarm: The representative from Dell was supposed to speak to the CC but there have been no approaches. Tomchrasky Windfarm: CC submitted comments

Loch Liath Windfarm: Near Bhlaraidh windfarm there is a scoping application for 26 turbines by Statkraft UK Ltd (German developer) the scoping has to be in by 2nd

February. The CC needs to look at the cumulative impact if they all go ahead as right in Balmacaan Forest, next to Bhlaraidh windfarm. Bhlaraidh currently has 32 turbines with a possible 20 if the extension is approved making a total of 78 turbines. There are four possible access routes to get the turbines to the site; SF to enter a scoping comment about routing through the village and the cumulative impact.

Bhlaraidh Extension: No update.

Fort Augustus Substation: The last meeting was on the 13th January which HC and JD attended. Andy Henderson is leaving the project with Laurie Kibblewhite taking over. They raised the seven-day working application which was turned down after Christmas for AMEY, from the 23rd January to a date in August. They are going to reapply with a more targeted application. Notification received of an outbreak of Covid in the workforce.

## 8. Correspondence

Email from Charles Stephen about winter resilience.

Received a letter of complaint from Mr C Ellice of Aberchalder complaining about the lack of Christmas lights in the village. DM replied direct that there were lights in the village but not on the A82 due to the costs involved as BEAR were charging £800. Everything else was in place on the 2nd December.

### 9. AOB

3 Glens Community Care: More interviews will take place on Friday. There are only three working that have cars, the other two are doing Fort Augustus because they don't drive. Have to speak to the Highland Hospice to get more befrienders. We've also had to use the Community Company village officers to grit roads as some of them are difficult to get to. Trying to get grit boxes in Mandally which is not our area as it is under Lochaber but MD advised to contact Alan Johnstone, the foreman who will drop some off.

3 Glens Resilience: A further £10,000 has come from Beinneun Community Fund for this community council area. The Community Company and the Glengarry Trust will work together to facilitate it for the 3 Glens Resilience Group.

Leisure Centre: DM asked for an update to be provided to the CC so that it can be minuted for the community. The report has now been completed and is quite encouraging.

MA investigated ways to improve broadband delivery which is not good within the village. There is a scheme run by the Community Fibre Partnership which allows you to engage with Openreach to enable you to upgrade the capabilities of the local exchange and there is something called the Gigabit Broadband Voucher Scheme which then enables you to get from the exchange to businesses or homes. This was sent to the Community Company who will look at it in February.

A couple of people have raised the issue of parking in The Riggs as works vans and school buses are parking there. MD stated that unless they get residents parking which will incur an annual charge, no one will enforce. There is a large car park opposite which is free for overnight use.

DM is to approach the dog warden after many complaints about dog fouling, which must be being perpetrated by locals as there is no tourism at present.

There will be a by-election in the Ward on the 11th March.
