

Community recreation field and play area – Invermoriston

Several suppliers of play and other equipment suggested by the Highland Council have visited the field and are preparing their ideas about how to improve the facilities for all. We hope to show the results and consult with the community about the options available shortly.

Potential community shop in Invermoriston

Thank you to all who have given their comments so far. An open meeting will be held on 13 September, in the Millennium Hall and, if positive, steps will then be taken to prepare a business plan for submission to the Fort Augustus and Glenmoriston Community Company.

Public toilets in Invermoriston

We managed to open these in early July with particular thanks to Clare and Mary for offering to clean them until the Highland Council could take over in line with their agreement. Donations by the users before the payment barriers were put in place were generous, indicating that the resumption of this service was appreciated.

Glenmoriston Heritage Group

The group is recommencing its monthly talks on the last Friday of the month. The first meeting will be on Friday September 23rd at 7.30 in the Millennium Hall, the topic being "The Heritage of Glenmoriston". The second will be on Friday 21st October, with a talk on the "Heritage of Dundreggan" given by Doug Gilbert. The AGM will be on Friday 18th November, with cheese and wine, with photos and chats about the old days.

St.Columba's Well

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Access to the Well is currently closed as the platform is unsafe. Thanks to generous support by the Beinneun Fern Community Fund and from the Fort Augustus and Glenmoriston Community Company, the Heritage Group has the funds to rebuild it in recycled materials, with the work starting in October.

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## **Glendoe Estate**

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The owners of Glendoe Estate, Hillhouse Estates Ltd, unveiled exciting new plans for their proposed business 'Ride Ness' & 'The Cottages' at a well-attended public event on 22nd August.



Representatives of the estate described the proposals:

'Ride Ness' will offer 15km of progressive downhill mountain bike tracks starting from one trail head. The trails will be of varying grades and will be accessed by a dedicated uplift service. The tracks will be designed and built to a high standard to create a unique offering that will suit all standards of rider.

Ride Ness will be centred around a hub providing a welcome facility for riders, a cafe, and bike hire shop as well as a large extended skills areas for riders to hone their techniques and receive specialist coaching.

Ride Ness will also include a high-quality food offering and meeting place for riders and non-riders with open views over Loch Ness. There will also be marked walks, playpark and 'Mini Landrover' experience for children where they can drive mini electrically powered vehicles around a track under adult supervision.



The project will also include 'The Cottages', which will be development of high-quality short stay accommodation within walking distance of Fort Augustus. The accommodation will comprise a mix of cottages, group lodges and pods. The accommodation will be available for holiday makers, visitors to the area, and for those

using Ride Ness. It will also provide accommodation for the staff of Ride Ness. The public event provided strong support for the plans and good feedback that will be taken forward into finalising the proposals.

Planning applications will be made to The Highland Council later this year or early next year. The proposals will bring about significant benefits to the local area including generation of around 30 new jobs. The jobs will include roles in:

- Management & Administration
- Mountain Bike Track Construction
- Mountain Bike Coaching
- Driving
- Maintenance
- Catering
- Housekeeping

As part of the plans Hillhouse Estates Ltd will explore opportunities to collaborate with existing businesses and explore opportunities with further education providers.

Hillhouse Estates Ltd, a family business owned by the Vernon family, have supported various community projects over many years.

Andrew Vernon, Chairman of the Hillhouse Estates Ltd commented 'that this offers an exciting opportunity that will broaden the existing visitor experience in the area and we are confident that by attracting visitors to the area the community of Fort Augustus will benefit from increased spend at local businesses. ## **Glengarry Shinty Club**

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It has been a busy summer for the Shinty Club and whilst our Junior section has a holiday, it has been all go for the men's and women's teams.

First up, our men's team competed in the Final of the inaugural Single Team Cup Competition against Col-Glen in Taynuilt – it was a great day out for the Club. However, in a very tense game, Col-Glen grabbed a late winning goal to take the cup back to Glendaruel with a 2-1 victory. There was the inevitable disappointment having not won, but this puts the fire in the belly to come back stronger next season.

The Club would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who travelled down to support the Club as it was a great turn out and the support was greatly appreciated.

There was no time to be too disappointed as the following Saturday, the men's team returned to league duty and have been consistently playing league fixtures throughout the summer. We have maintained our second-place position in the league and we push on in the hope there is a slip up from top team Inverness as we have 4 fixtures left in the league. Two of these are at home so still plenty of time left to get along and take in a match.

Our women's team have been busy too and are also sitting in second position in the league. We push on with 3 league fixtures remaining. Whilst we feel the league is out of our grasp this season; this year was about integrating our younger players into the team and this has been seamless as Erin, Ruby and Lexie have transitioned easily and are now firmly first picks for the team.

The Women's Development team have also been busy, as this has been a great opportunity for our up-and-coming junior girls to get their first taste of women's shinty against some very experienced development teams. We started their development league campaign back in March and in our first few rounds we were losing matches 3 or 4 nil. However, progressing 5 months on, the girls have become a difficult team to beat – winning and drawing around 85% of their matches and have only lost 5 games since the early rounds of the league, This shows the growth in confidence and highlights the sheer determination of the youngsters who have been undoubtedly physically outmatched but have never given up or stopped trying to do better.

The Women's Camanachd Association has really hit the nail on the head with regards to the Development League format. It is a great tool for allowing younger and less experienced players the opportunity to play without the pressure and demands of a competitive league match. As a small club, this is something that we feel the Camanachd Association could really learn from and look at integrating this WCA initiative into the men's game.

Whilst the senior teams have been busy all summer, our Juniors have enjoyed a summer break after a packed May and June. We have now restarted junior shinty sessions and are again blown away with numbers attending and once again have loads of junior shinty fixtures coming up over the next month or so.

Before the summer break, along with Invergarry Primary, Kilchuimen Primary and Academy, we awarded our first every School Shinty Player of the Year awards. As a club, we were delighted to be involved in the schools' end of term celebrations and enjoyed the musical talents of the pupils greatly.

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We have done a lot of work with all the schools and it has been incredible to see them represented in shinty competitions once again after a long absence. We are incredibly grateful to all the teachers and parent helpers who have made this possible.

Our first award was the Invergarry Primary Player of Year and this was awarded to Finlay Davies. Finlay has always had plenty of skill and ability but was often restricted by his confidence. However, since March we have really seen him grow into himself and assume the lead role. As the oldest player in the team, this includes keeping the younger players right on the pitch and organising them off the pitch. Without a doubt, the independence sport gives children has been massively positive in Finlay's growth not just as a shinty player but also as a young man and we are really excited to see his progress going forward.

Our second award was to our Kilchuimen Primary Player of the Year and this was a very easy selection for us with the award going to Scott Cameron. Scott is a very talented and determined player. All the younger boys look up to him and he really delivers as a role model on and off the pitch. Scott has great ability and reads the game incredibly well but also has a steely determination that sees him chase every ball and literally never give up – wonder where he gets that from?

Our final award was for our Kilchuimen Academy Player of the Year and this was awarded to Jack West. Jack has worked incredibly hard to ensure his break into the senior team and we have seen this really pay off over the last few months. Jack is quiet and unassuming and has been since he started playing in P1. Whilst he has seen his junior team mates come and go as they move on, Jack has remained a mainstay in our junior set up and we are excited to see him break in to the senior team.

We also made one more award on our visit to Kilchuimen Academy and that was to our dear friend Bill the Jannie. With so many teams and age groups playing shinty, the MUGA becomes our second home in the winter months and this was only possible because of Bill. We were exceptionally grateful for his support and flexibility towards the club. He enjoyed seeing kids coming as wee P1's and progressing through the levels, always taking the time to ask how things were going and like us all, was excited about the opportunities ahead for the children. Like so many in our community, we were deeply saddened by his passing and having the opportunity to show him how much we thought of him. He will remain very special to us all here at the Club.

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## **Bicentenary of the Caledonian Canal**

At half past five on the afternoon of Thursday, the 24th October 1822, a crowd of spectators and a grand cannon-fire salute (Inverlochy), two steam yachts and a sloop tied up in the newly constructed Corpach sea lock at the western end of the Caledonian Canal. Thomas Telford and William Jessop had designed and brought into being the largest canal in Britain and, indeed the world at the time (their original intention was head up Loch Shiel and Loch Eil out to Mallaig but found that the cut in some places needed to be 30ft deep and wastoo costly). Their voyage began thirty hours earlier at Muirtown basin in Inverness. After proposing a toast, Mr Charles Grant, a member of Parliament for Inverness and one of the commissioners of the Canal remarked that it was "one of the most stupendous undertakings of that nature which Europe had seen, not so much for its length but its depth which was twenty feet" and the world at the time.


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The vision of the canal had been seen over a century before its construction when Coinneach Odhar said "in the not too far off, we will see full-rigged ships will sail eastwards and westwards by Muirtown and Tomnahurich."

Captain Edward Burt discussed the possibility of a waterway as early as 1773 and the Forfeited Estates Commissioner had employed James Watt to survey the line for the canal. His design was deemed too expensive at £165,000 but without his technical genius in the form of a monstrous 36H.P beam engine to drain the lock pits, it is doubtful whether Thomas Telford for all his ingenuity, could have built the canal by the autumn of 1822. By 1801, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Mr Vansittart was supporting the new survey which culminated in the Caledonian Canal Act and dispatched Thomas Telford north in 1803. Britain was at war and funds were short. They hoped that the construction of the canal would be used for commercial use and that the Navy could avoid the treacherous Pentland Firth. It took nineteen years to complete this great feat of engineering at the cost of £650,000 not forgetting the men and women that worked in atrocious weather and conditions to create this fantastic waterway. When we as locals take this beautiful canal that runs through the centre of the village for granted, I always think how on earth did they manage to divert the River Oich from where the shops and cafes are on the west side of the canal. Remembering that they had no machinery and how the masons cut those large blocks, I can only admire them and hope their names are in the Canal archives somewhere. Without them we wouldn't have the great monument of the Caledonian Canal which gives employment and is a big tourist attraction with the five lock gates.

At the same time of the construction of the Caledonian Canal, Thomas Telford was also constructing the new road from Fort William to Inverness. The military road from Fort Augustus to Inverness was on the south east side of Loch Ness and was completed in the early 1730s. However, it was rather steep for carriage travel, and Thomas Telford was asked to consider a new road to Fort Augustus, along the north side by Invermoriston. Work started by 1805 after a successful bid by a Fort William contractor who had Sir John Campbell of Ardnamurchan as his guarantor. Unfortunately, this contractor proved most unreliable and had abandoned the contact by the end of 1808. Sir John had to complete it at his own expense, losing £2000 on the contract. Work was completed by 1813 and involved in building several bridges, including the one over the River Oich. Unfortunately, it was badly damaged in the great floods of 1849, the Oich bridge was left with just a single spam on the north side, the rest being carried away by the force of the river. The stone arch was left in place and the missing parts were replaced with a wooden trestle bridge which is still in evidence today, though the bridge is now unsafe.

## **Stories in the Land**

Stories in the Land: pupils follow the tracks of the Highland Drovers

In my new role with the Royal Scottish Geographical Society (RSGS), I've just started to work with the primary schools in Invergarry and Fort Augustus on themes linked to the recent Glen of the Bards Project (which explored the musical heritage of Glenmoriston). P3/4/5 at Kilchuimen are learning about crofting life in the late 17th/early 18th century. Upper stages at Kilchuimen and Invergarry are exploring the life of the Highland cattle drovers at the time of the Jacobite rebellion.

They are using a teaching approach called 'Storyline' which uses a story to deliver the curriculum. I co-wrote these with a wonderful, retired educator called Sallie Harkness when I was previously working for RSGS before moving to Glenmoriston. Recently, Sallie and I have been adapting these so that the story settings for each school are in their village. This has involved a bit of research and for the past 6 weeks I've been spending Thursday mornings at the Glengarry Heritage Centre. If you haven't been there, it's well worth a visit - with the bonus that it's next to the community cafe with delicious home-baking!

Last week, I found the answer to a question that I had been puzzling over - where the women & children of Cill Chuimein took their cattle to graze during the summer months. Seemingly the main shielings were at Lagan a' Bhainne (The Dairy Glade) high up on the Corrieyairick Pass. You can find the site marked on the OS 1:25 map. Here's a lovely description from 'Glen Albyn - Tales & Truths of the Central Highlands' the wee book I found at the Glengarry Heritage Centre which was published in 1909.

'Some way further on, just where the road slopes up to the last ascent to the summit of the range, we come to a rich green strath stretching towards the River Tarff. Here it was that the people of Kilchuimein used to pitch their summer shielings. The shielings


were small huts made with sods with a rude covering of boughs and turf. For some four months or so during the summer and early autumn, the entire population would migrate from the lower valley to these abodes, and while the cattle cropped the lush summer grass on the mountain side, the inhabitants would lay in store cheese and dairy produce against the long cold winter months. The green strath is known as Lagan a Bhainne or The Dairy Glade.

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On the opposite side of the bank of the River Tarff, we see a large black rock jutting out into the middle of the stream. On top of this boulder, as the water swirled away on foam, the piper took his stand and played throughout the live-long summer night, when the sun scarce sets at all, whilst the youths and maidens merrily footed it on the springy turf and the older folk looked on and encouraged them with applause.'

There is another fascinating book that was published around the same time, which has lots of information about the village after 1715. It's simply called 'Kilcumein and Fort Augustus' and was written by one of the monks at the abbey. It's likely that the pupils will have lots of questions as they begin to research what the settlements in Invergarry and Fort Augustus were like two to three hundred years ago. I know many local people will have interesting and important information to share. Maureen Ferguson has already been brilliant, helping me to locate where the cattle stance was in Fort Augustus at Market Hill. This was the place where the drovers grazed their cattle on their long journey to the markets in Crieff. We hope to share some of the pupils learning at the Glen of the Bards event at Glengarry Community Hall on Sunday 13th November at 2pm. There will be more information nearer the time.

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#### AN UPDATE ON OUR PROJECTS

#### **Memorial Hall**

In common with many Asset Transfers progress is slow. We have a meeting with the council on the 1st September where we hope to find out what plans, if any, the Highland Council have for the hall. Having had a good look around the whole building now there is lots of potential for the community to make better use of it, so hopefully we can convince the council that an Asset Transfer is in their and our best interests.

#### **Glentarff House**

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Progress is also slow here as well. Unlike the Highland Council, Scottish Canals do not have staff or systems in place to deal specifically with Asset Transfers, so this feels like new ground for them. We are getting a survey, valuation and options appraisal completed this month. Hopefully it will be financially feasible and we can make some progress.

#### **Campervan Waste Disposal Point**

Another project where progress is very slow. Once we get on the ground it should take less than a week to complete, if we can co-ordinate activities by Scottish Water and SSE. Unfortunately getting on the ground requires a lease from the Highland Council which has taken an inordinate amount of time to complete. Hopefully by the time you are reading this it will be ready!

#### **Community Growing**

We wanted some direction and advice on how to progress with the Lovat Lawn and Convent Land. To that end we asked a garden designer based in the Black Isle to come and take a look. They use the no dig method or hugel beds on their land which I have to say sounds ideal to me. No dig uses a layer of cardboard straight on top of the ground topped with compost and a hugel bed uses branches and compost. If you are interested I would encourage you to look them up as my explanation is very oversimplified. It was very encouraging for both sites and subsequently we commissioned topographical surveys of the sites to ascertain the lay of the land and how best to lay out the planting areas. We have no shortage of branches for the hugel beds but we could do with collecting cardboard so please donate your waste cardboard. ۲

Presentations were given about Auchterawe Battery Storage by Bex Sherwood, Jamey Rhind-Tutt from Field and Gordon Thomson from Lichfields and the other for Scottish Water by Gavin Steel and Kelton Bennett (reports attached).

Minutes - proposed by Iain MacKnocher and seconded by Jeff Dymond.

Matters Arising – Invermoriston Toilets seems to be on track but Highland Council are having difficulty getting cleaners.

Invermoriston Speed Limit – No update but a group to is be set up for Fort Augustus & Glenmoriston, Drumnadrochit and Abriachan/Lochend. Speed survey to be done on the road going west from the Invermoriston.

Grass cutting – GIG lease for recreational field to be signed on 1st July. Highland Council are still responsible for the cemeteries.

Access – DM to speak Stuart Easthaugh to be contacted about breaches.

Allotment and Community Garden – meeting at Lovat Arms at 11am this Friday with Caroline Gregory. Helen to discuss the waste ground at Abertarff Place.

Fort Augustus Pier – A letter came from a member of the public about the unsightly Heras fencing which is an eyesore at an iconic site. Helen was to approach Scottish Canals.

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Parking on Oich Road – still a big problem as there are no charges. Traffic Order still to be done so cannot enforce yet. Have contacted Shane Manning about the problem as well as John Taylor about the dreadful state of the canalside road which is full of potholes and Rabbie's minibuses parking so as not to pay charges.

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Scottish Canals – HC and DM have brought up the issue about the Glentarff and Caledonian House many times but there has been progress with the Community Company who have approached Scottish Canals about taking over ownership but response has been slow. Ian Leaver, chief officer of the Community Company stated that they were also looking at taking on the ownership of the Memorial Hall to open up the Service Point again, improve the hall with the possibility of a library and other options. Surveys are in various shops for local support.

Jubilee Events - The weekend went well with events in all three villages which will be in the next Ness News.

Forest and Land Scotland – many residents have been asking about campervans and motorhomes going up and down Jenkins Park and Auchterawe. DM spoke to Sam Brown this afternoon and seemingly it was the national team that decided to put Auchterawe down as a site online. The local team were not happy with this decision as there was no consultation to them or the local community but as from today it has been taken down from being online and the signage will

be removed this weekend and replaced with No Camping signs. It was causing the local Forestry a lot of problems.

Signage – unauthorised signage in the village is becoming a problem and Allan Bryce from Planning Enforcement is coming out shortly.

Broadband – ongoing but DF stated that Emma Knox was trying to get a group formed as it was an issue around the whole Ward.

Police Report - attached.

Treasurer's Report - The balance up to today is £4780.49 with £86 paid out to Zurich Insurance and £500 paid back to Highland Council because of an error on their part. There is still money ringfenced for car park and walks signage. After having taken nearly a year for the Bank of Scotland to change signatories, MA is now our Treasurer and is a signatory. The bank's delay is the reason that our accounts have not been done for our AGM.

#### **Community Amenity Issues**

Roads - DM still pushing for improvements in parking, canalside and Ardachy roads and will give feedback to Shane Manning about the bottleneck situation at Oich Road onto A82.

#### Renewable Energy Projects

Auchterawe Substation – Five new residents have not been invited to these meetings. HC will get a list of the properties and inform Lisa Marchi's replacement, Ryan Davidson.

Cloiche - Ongoing

Tomachrasky – email received from Catherine Wales on 24th June with letter from Gilbert Stevenson, E Power Ltd

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Bhlaraidh - Ongoing

Coire Glas – Consultation meeting on 1st July between 2pm and 7 pm and a virtual meeting will be held on Tuesday 5th July. A local resident stated that underground lines would be preferable to overhead ones for houses within 2-3Km. It is more expensive but do-able and would make an enormous difference to residents. Another local resident stated that there are no members of the community who agree with the proposed route going through the local wood,

an amenity used by people from the wider area including Invermoriston as well as Fort Augustus. Forest and Land Scotland have spent  $\pounds100,000$  upgrading paths and bridges within the wood this year and the proposed route would decimate a sizeable proportion of it (45 metres wide) to accommodate the overhead lines.


